COMMUNICATION.

As the legal mode of suppressing riots forms an interesting topic at present, it may convey information to some to reprint from Tomlio's Law Dictionary part of the article, "Posse Comitatus." The power of the country; including all knights, and other men above the age of fifteen in the country; but ecclesiastical persons and such as labour under any infirmity are not compellable to attend. Persons able to travel were required to be assistant in this service. It is used where a Riot is committed, a possession is kept or a forcible entry, or any force or rescue made contrary to the commandment of the King's Writ, or in apposition to the execution of Justice.
