At a meeting of the Inhabitants of Kingston, held at the Court House, on Thursday, June 14, 1832, for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of adopting some measures to prevent the spread of Cholera in the Town.

THOMAS MARLAND, Esq. in the Chair. 1. Moved by Rev. R. D. Cartwright; seconded by J. S. Cartwright, Esq.

That whereas by recent accounts from Quebec, it appears that the disease called Asiatic Spasmodic Cholera has appeared in that city, thus affording indubitable proof that the disorder has been imported from Europe, we cannot close our eyes to the almost fearful certainty that this awful visitation of Almighty God will soon reach this Town.

2. Moved by M. S. Bidwell, Esq.; seconded by W. H. Gray, Esq.

That as every individual is deeply interested in the preservation of the Public Health, it is the bounden duty of all to combine cheerfully in such measures as may serve under the divine blessing to arrest the spread of the disease at its very commencement, and to mitigate the sufferings of its unfortunate victims.

3. Moved by Samuel Shaw, Esq.; seconded by Mr. John Strang.

That for the purpose of conveying into full effect the objects of the second resolution, it will be absolutely necessary to provide a temporary shelter for the reception of those who may be attacked, as well with a view for the careful separation of the diseased from the healthy, as to afford to the former the most prompt and effectual means towards the promotion of their recovery; and that the said building be provided under the direction and superintending of the Medical Gentlemen of the town with whatever they may deem necessary to the fulfilment of the object in view.

4. Moved by Geo. Mackenzie, Esq.; seconded by Alex. Fringle, Esq.

That a subscription be now opened for the purpose of providing a fund to defray the unavoidable expenses attending the necessary measures of precaution and relief.

5. Moved by Francis A. Harper, Esq.; seconded by Dr. George Evans.

That a respectful application be made to His Excellency Sir John Colborne to request such pecuniary aid towards this charitable design as it may be in the power of His Excellency to grant from any funds at his disposal.

6. Moved by Thomas Dalton, Esq.; seconded by Thomas Kirkpatrick, Esq.

That a Committee be forthwith formed, to whom will be entrusted the management and disposal of the funds, the correspondence of the association, and all other matters connected with the same.

7. Moved by Thos. Kirkpatrick, Esq.; seconded by J. S. Cartwright, Esq.

That the following gentlemen be a committee with full power to adopt and carry into effect such measures as they may judge necessary towards the object of this meeting.

Strain the contents through a piece of fine muslin, to obtain the entire strength from the rhubarb. To this add 120 drops of laudanum, and the same quantity of the spirits of lavender. This will make about a dozen doses, of a wine glass full each, and a dose to be given on the first attack of vomiting; and should it be severe and not stop in half an hour after the first dose, the second to be given.

POSTSCRIPT.

Chronicle Office, 8 1/2 o'clock, Saturday Morning. DREADFUL CHOLERA AT QUEBEC AND MONTREAL.—By the arrival of the William the IV. this morning, the apprehensions we entertained of the progress of this awful pestilence have been too faithfully realised in the accounts communicated by several respectable gentlemen passengers on board this vessel. The Quebec papers of Wednesday (which have not yet reached Kingston) report the deaths, amounting to forty-four, in forty-eight hours. The Medical Board at Montreal have publicly pronounced the disease to be the Asiatic Cholera, as may be too justly inferred from the following extract of the melancholy report:

Table with 2 columns: Category and Count. On the 11th and 12th. Severe Cases, 51. Mild, 43. Total, 94. Revived or uncertain, 71. Deaths, 23.

We cannot too urgently entreat our fellow townsmen to unite as one man, and use every human power within their reach to resist, if possible, the further progress of this desolating scourge; to co-operate with the committee; to appoint a health officer; and to see that the dirty and the dissolute may be instantly separated from the cleanly and the temperate. Without every energy and every moral exertion, there will be nothing, under Providence, to save this already overpopulated town from the contagion that so furiously rages within forty-eight hours reach of the place!
