Another man. named Boireau, and been arrested, and is said to have confessed his participation in the plot. Suspicion was directed to him by the fact that he was visited on the night previous at his workshop, by two persons, richly dressed, and that after they left him, he advised his employer not to go to the review, as there would be trouble.

Girard was somewhat better, but by no means out of danger. The physicians were with him constantly. He had been visited by the ministers, anxious to obtain information. The number of persons arrested on the 31st was 59, among whom was Armand Carrel, editor of the National.

From Galignani's Messenger. We understand that several days ago, General Baron Athlin was warned by anonymous letters, that an attempt was to be made during the review upon the life of the King, and on Tuesday morning one was sent to the Baron, stating that his Majesty would be fired upon with musketry from the roofs of the houses, to make the necessary examinations, and yet the vigilant eye of the General was upon the window at the moment when the explosion took place.

It was generally stated yesterday that Girard had taken a nearer aim at the King and his sone than was at first supposed; this is corroborated by the following paragraph in the Temps of this morning :- "The Ministers, presided by the King, assembled in Council twice yesterday. After the first Council, which broke up at ten o'clock, His Majesty felt rather an acute pain in the head, and did not dine with the family as usual .-The second Council, however, was held at 8 o'clock. One of the Ministers remarked an eschymosis in the forehead of the King, who then admitted he had received a contusion from a ball which he had been desirous of keeping secret. It appears that bleeding was deemed advisable. The Duke of Orleans has also a contusion in the left thigh hear the knee. A ball struck the hind quarter of the Prince of Joinville's horse."

The Constitutionel says :- On the table in Girard's room, it is said, was found a petition addressed to the King as from an old soldier, which it was supposed was intended to have been presented to His Majesty immediately opposite the window, in order to make a momentary stoppage and thus afford a more favourable opportunity for committing the intended crime.
