Ween we to receive only a dry detail of events; of sattles and treaties, with a long list of regal names, who would submit to the task of reading his pages? For these particulars we might resort to many works of acknowledged correctness. We might exult in the glories of Brian the brave, or trace the line of kingly herees up to Gomar; but we would feel little curiosity in hearing what has been so often recounted, unless it were made a medium by which we would receive some additional knowledge. And this is precisely what Mr. Jeffers has done in the historical part of his work. He has made it entireby subservient to his grand design of elucidating the Irish character; the leading traits of which he shews to have been the same in every epoch. But nt is in the analysis of it, as known and felt in the present day, that he puts forth his powers. It is it this that his disquisitional nicety appears, and that he gives, "with the flash of the gem its solidity 100." Ever and anon relieved by some sparkling anecdate or choice saying worth an epic, the reader

is both delighted and instructed. From what has been already said, it is evident that Mr. Jeffers is the encomiast of the Irish. But there is nothing invidious in his estimation of Hibernian greatness. He denies not the merit of other nations; but he wishes to establish the claims of his own, which all are too ready to forget.

I would remark, en passant, that I have been antichating a little, having seen only the first number of "The Milesians" (which is merely introductory,) in a finished state. But from the promise which it holds forth, together with the view which the author has given of his entire plan, I doubt not that the highest expectations will be realized. And I feel certain that the public generally, and Irishmen in articular, will aid him in the completion of his undertaking. I expect to see his subscription list extended with a chain of names that would reach (as Daniel ("Connell says,) "from the Giant's Causeway to Cape Clear."
