

quots of men, and have them ready to embark from this place by 12 o'clock on the following day, and by six o'clock on the following morning, sixty men from Caldwell, New Georgia, and this place, were ready to proceed to the assistance of their brethren. The distance to Millsburg being much greater, the volunteers did not reach this till late in the afternoon. About 9 o'clock A. M. the English brig St. Lucia, Captain Rawling, trading from Liverpool, arrived from the leeward, with Mr. and Mrs. Hankinson, and one woman who saved her life by getting under the house, when the ruthless fiends were passing like a destroying angel through the place. The intelligence received from Mr. H. pointed out the propriety of adopting some method that would enable the vice agent to supply Edina with provisions. To do which, as the stock on hand was small, it was necessary to reduce the number of men intended to be sent, to fifteen, who sailed on the 15th for Edina. On the 16th, the brig Ruth, Captain Taylor, arrived from Little Bassa, bringing Mr. Pinney, who, at the time of the massacre, was about 18 miles up the river, at a place selected for a missionary location. The intelligence by Mr. Pinney, is still more painful.

A letter from D. W. Whitehurst, Esq., (at Edina) written subsequently to Mr. Weaver's, states the number killed at 27, in addition to some that have since died of wounds. From this number, however, must be deducted the three brought up in the St. Lucia. Mr. and Mrs. Hankinson owe their preservation to the fidelity of a Krooman, who protected them while the merciless savages were dealing death to all around them. As soon as an opportunity offered, the Krooman conducted them to his own town; whence they were taken off by Captain Rawling, and kindly brought to this place. What was the immediate cause of the attack, we have not been able to learn; but we have no hesitation in believing, that the smallest show of military preparation would have prevented the attack. But the principle on which the colony was founded, is one that forbids every thing like military preparation, consequently, they fell an easy prey to the villainous savages.

**FROM EDINA.**—On the 10th instant, the schooner Timbuctoo, Captain Fernandez, arrived from Edina with 35 of the unfortunate Port Cresson company. They were truly in a pitiable predicament, many having nothing more than their clothes which they stood in. Their sufferings and privations were promptly met by the attention of the people in this place; each one seemed anxious to be foremost in expression of sympathy, and by administering whatever could contribute to their comfort.

Previous arrangements having been made by the acting agent, they were at once located in one of the public receptacles, where they will probably remain until orders from America.

**DECLARATION OF WAR.**  
Agency House, Monrovia, July 14th, 1855.  
—Council met according to appointment. Present, N. Brander, Esq. acting agent, counsellors John Day, P. Moore, T. Pritchard, and M. A. White.

1. Resolved, That the proceeding of the town meeting, held in this place on the 8th and 9th inst. and presented to the acting agent by a committee appointed for the purpose, be read.

2. Resolved, That the most recent intelligence from Edina be laid before the council. The acting agent and colonial secretary presented each one a letter which were read.

3. Resolved, That the injuries recently inflicted by King Joe Harris on the persons and property of several citizens of Liberia, and his present menacing and hostile movements, threatening the existence of the settlement at Edina, demand the most prompt and energetic measures on the part of this government, to secure its peace and safety, therefore,

4. Resolved, That war be and the same is hereby declared against King Joe Harris, subject, however, to the following provisions: That three commissioners be sent to Bassa, charged with the following instructions:

To demand from King Joe an explanation of his late conduct.  
To demand reparation for his aggressions on the persons and property of Americans.  
To demand security as sufficient and adequate as the nature of the circumstances will admit, for the future peace and safety of the colony generally, and its citizens individually, as well as for the preservation on the part of King Joe, of those amicable relations which have hitherto subsisted between this colony and King Joe.

That his delivery of the persons of the aggressors, and that alone, will be considered reparation.  
That in the event of failing to accomplish the above purposes, the declaration of the 4th resolution be vigorously prosecuted.

In order to give energy and effect to the deliberations of the commissioners, and thereby prevent an effusion of human blood—

5. Resolved, That the acting agent be authorized to accept the voluntary services of one hundred men, to be armed, accoutred, provisioned, and properly officered by the acting agent, to accompany the commissioners to Bassa.

6. Resolved, That Major J. C. Barbour and John Day, Esq. from Monrovia, and John Hanson, Esq. from Edina, be the commissioners.

On motion of John Day,  
7. Resolved, That the acting agent be vested, and he is hereby vested with authority to make any laws or regulations that he may deem needful during the disturbed state of affairs at Edina, and any laws so made shall be of the same force and effect, though made by the whole council assembled.

Resolved, That the council adjourn sine die.

**Proclamation—Colony of Liberia.**—To all whom it may concern. Know ye that I, Nathaniel Brander, acting agent of the American colonization society, taking into consideration the disturbed and agitated state of the colony, arising from the war, now raging at Edina, and to afford an opportunity for an undivided attention to the speedy termination of hostilities; and also with a view to meet the spirit of a resolution of the board of managers of the American colonization society, founded upon a petition, from the colony, that the election of civil officers, shall take place on the second Tuesday in December, and that said officers shall hold their offices during twenty-four calendar months.

Resolved, That the 4th article of the plan of civil government for the colony of Liberia, be so amended, as to read, "two," "six" counsellors; this amendment not to take effect until the next annual election in the colony; and that the other articles be so altered as to correspond with this and other amendments, which may now be made, have postponed, and by virtue of the authority vested in me as acting agent of the A. C. society, do postpone the election of civil officers for the colony, until the second Tuesday in December next ensuing; so that the officers that may be elected for the ensuing year, will enter upon the duties of their office on the first day of January, 1856.

God save the Commonwealth.

In the Belleville Intelligencer of the 3d inst. there appears an article containing some very

ridiculous charges against the magistrates of Kingston, but more particularly directed against a very active and efficient member of that body—A. Manahan, Esq. The writer's motives in giving publicity to statements so unfounded, are best known to himself, but we are strongly tempted to believe that they were directed by motives by no means consistent with the principles which should direct the writings of a public journalist. However, as we said before, that is his business; ours to show the fallacy of the statements set forth. We should hardly have deemed the matter worthy of notice had it not been that with some degree of ingenuity, a sprinkling of facts are mixed up with the mass of fiction, so that unless the affair was properly explained, there might be some chance of the Intelligencer's account finding some persons credulous enough to believe it.

The following is the true state of the case: John Gilson, a school-master, residing in the township of Thurlow, in the county of Hastings, had forged several school reports for the purpose of defrauding the Board of Education of the Midland District, and had so far succeeded that he had obtained by these means something about £100. A warrant, dated the 25th March, and signed by A. Marshall, J. P. and Wm. Ketchison, J. P. was directed against Gilson, and he was accordingly arrested and sent to Kingston gaol. On the 31st of March, Dr. Marshall enclosed some documents relative to the transaction, to J. Macaulay, Esq., the Chairman of the Petit Sessions, at the same time stating a desire that the matter should be more thoroughly investigated, as Gilson's accusers were not of the best character. Accordingly Mr. Ashley, the gaoler, by desire of the Chairman, called a meeting of three magistrates, and it was then, and then only, that the affair first came before the notice of the magistrates of Kingston.

At this meeting Thos. Kirkpatrick, Esq. deposited on oath, that he had seen the warrant upon which Gilson had been arrested, and that it recited that it was upon the complaint and information of Ruth Gilson, the delinquent's wife, that the warrant was granted. The illegality of the proceeding, was, by this deposition, fully established; and without hesitation the Magistrates admitted the prisoner to bail to await any further proofs that might be brought against him at the Quarter Sessions, which bail was extended and Gilson was enlarged. At the subsequent Quarter Sessions Dr. Marshall gave in additional evidence of Gilson's guilt, and it was then determined to commit him for trial at the Assizes, which was immediately done, but subsequently, in accordance with the opinion of James Nickalls, Esq. the Clerk of the Peace, he was again admitted to bail, and a bond was sent to be executed at Belleville, which was returned to the Gaoler, in whose hands it remained, and by virtue of which Gilson was again liberated.

During the Assizes Mr. Manahan states that he frequently spoke to Dr. Marshall and Mr. Ketchison about Gilson's case, urging them to take the opinion of the Attorney General on the subject. Matters, however, remained in the same state until the indictment was found, when Gilson disappeared; but a few days after the Assizes he returned to Kingston, when he was a third time committed to prison, and remained in confinement until the sitting of the late special Court of Assize, when the Court admitted him to bail in two sureties, of £20 each—thus completely justifying the act of the Magistrates who first admitted him to bail, and proving the opinion of Mr. Nickalls on the same subject to be equally correct. How or why the bail bond was not estranged on the disappearance of Gilson, Mr. Manahan disclaims all knowledge of. So far from it being a fact that the Attorney General had threatened a prosecution against Mr. Manahan for his part in this affair, that it is well known that that gentleman was pleased to express himself in a manner highly laudatory of Mr. Manahan's general conduct as a Magistrate. So much for the veracity of the Belleville Intelligencer, and so much for its folly in attempting to fix an odium on the magistrates of Kingston, when if blame can be at all attachable, it must lie at the door of those who blunderingly committed a man to jail on the evidence of his own wife. The Intelligencer seems to single out Mr. Manahan as the chief mover in this business, and accordingly levels all its invectives at him, evidently for the purpose of injuring him in the opinion of the public. Mr. Manahan had no more to say in the transaction than the other magistrates who were associated with him in the investigation, and we therefore must come to the conclusion that this article has been bolstered up merely for the purpose of giving annoyance to that gentleman. However, it is of little consequence; *Dat Deus immitit cornua curta bovi*, and so we have done.

This morning, Oliver Osburn was brought before the sitting Magistrates, charged by the President and Directors of the Commercial Bank with forging a document purporting to be the promissory note for £40 of a Mr. Reuben Shorey, and endorsed by Miles Shorey. The forgery was committed in 1854, while the prisoner was a clerk with Mr. Taylor, of Camden. The note was discounted at the Commercial Bank, and shortly after which Osburn left his employment and went to the United States. When the note came to maturity, the forgery was of course discovered, and some circumstances coming to light, fixed suspicion on the prisoner. The writing on the note and Osburn's entries in Mr. Smith's day-book being compared, these suspicions became stronger, but Osburn being absent, the matter was dropped for the time. Osburn, however, a few days ago returned to Camden, which circumstance becoming known to the Directors of the Bank, Mr. Barton Phillips was despatched yesterday at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, with a warrant to apprehend him, which he succeeded in doing, and after a journey of 64 miles, had him safely lodged in jail at half past 6 o'clock this morning. On his examination he allowed that there was a similarity between his hand-writing and the writing on the note, but denied ever having seen the document before. Several witnesses were examined, who all agreed as to the similarity of the hand-writing. The magistrates, in order to give the

prisoner time to collect evidence on his own behalf, adjourned the examination until Tuesday, at the same time Mr. Manahan gave him notice that he would produce a witness who could prove that he saw the note in his (the prisoner's) possession.

Benjamin L. Hinkley, a native of the United States, and whose residence is near Rochester, was then brought forward, charged by Thos. Frisby a private of the 24th Regt. with tampering with the said Frisby, in order to induce him to desert. The soldier states that going into Hall's tavern on Friday, for the purpose of getting something to drink, the prisoner entered into conversation with him, and the prisoner entered into conversation with him, and among other things said, that it was a pity such a fine looking fellow should wear a red coat. He further stated that Hinkley gave him eleven pence in money, and offered him a blue coat and waistcoat, that he might more securely escape when so disguised. Hall the landlord of the tavern saw the parties engaged in conversation, and suspecting the object of the prisoner, told them, he would suffer no such doings in his house. The prisoner denied the charge altogether; the Magistrates then acquiesced the prisoner with the penalties which the law directed against persons convicted of this crime, and further informed him that he stood committed to stand his trial at the next assizes, but that he might be liberated on bail, provided he entered into sureties himself in £200 and two others in £100 each, he was then remanded back to prison.

**OBITUARY.**  
We regret to have to announce the melancholy fact of the death of Colonel Tux, C. B., commanding the 24th Regiment, and Commandant of this Garrison, which took place, very suddenly, at ten minutes before 11 o'clock last night, aged 60 years.

—Col. Tux entered the service in July, 1792, as an Ensign in the 41st Foot; joined the 24th Regiment in December, same year, and in May, 1794, obtained his Lieutenantcy; was promoted Captain in the 1st W. I. Regiment in 1798; joined the 1st (or Scots Royal) Regiment, in January, 1800, and in April, 1807, exchanged into the 8th W. I. Regiment; was promoted Major in September, same year, into the 14th Foot; was appointed Brevet Lt. Colonel in 1813, and on the 6th November, 1826, obtained the Lt. Colonelcy of the 44th Foot; in August, 1839, was appointed Lt. P. Officer of a Recruiting District, and in July, 1830, was promoted Brevet Colonel; on the 1st March, 1833, was appointed to the command of the 24th Foot, vice Lieut. Colonel Fleming, and joined the service companies of that regiment in Canada, on the 17th August following; was present at, and distinguished himself in the following engagements, viz.—Capture of Martinique, Guadeloupe, and St. Lucia in the West Indies, from 1793 to 1796; was employed against the Maroons; the assault on Morn, Fortune, and at Waterloo; at the assault on Cambray, for which he was honored by His Majesty, George the Third, with the distinguished mark of "Companion of the Bath;" also filled the important situations, of Assistant Adjutant General, in Spain, under Sir D. Baird; Acting Adjutant General, under Sir A. Wellesley, in the Peninsula; and Deputy Adjutant General, under Sir A. Campbell, in India; has served in almost every climate, including West Indies, Gibraltar, Spain, Portugal, Walcheren, Malta, Genoa, Flanders, France, Iouan Islands, Bengal, Rangson, in Ava, and lately in Canada, where he terminated his military career, after a service of upwards of 43 years, on full pay, and on a pension; devoted to his king and country, he lived an ornament to his profession, and died regretted by his brother Officers and Soldiers, and all who had the honor of his acquaintance.
