We have to remind our readers that Wednesday next, is the day fixed for the meeting at the Court House, to consider the necessity of incorporating the Provincial Parliament for an Act to incorporate the town of Kingston.

The advantages arising to Kingston from a measure of this kind, we are convinced would soon be developed, and although the expenses attendant on the maintenance of a corporation may be looked on with dismay by many, yet a short time would convince the timorous that the benefits arising from the organization would more than counter-balance the expenditure. The case is nearly parallel to the expediency of establishing Turnpikes on Public Roads, which though often viewed as a severe tax, yet a little calculation will ever show how short-sighted the policy is to refuse paying a penny where a pound (though coming indirectly) may be the return.

It is not, however, the intention of the friends to this measure to recommend to the inhabitants of Kingston, an establishment on a scale so absurdly expensive as that adopted in Toronto. It is simply proposed to have the Town divided in Wards, which wards should furnish representatives to form a Common Council, having the power of regulating all the affairs of the City, financial or otherwise. Thus all the public monies of the city would be controlled by the inhabitants themselves, in the persons of their representatives. An incorporated police establishment in this town would certainly have plenty to do for some time in remedying the many glaring deficiencies at present existing; for instance:—In our last publication we had communications from two Correspondents, each complaining of defects in the arrangement of matters connected with the Fire establishment of this Town. The first complaining that one half of Kingston might be burned down before the other half knew any thing of the matter, for want of a bell sufficiently loud to give general notice of the danger. The other says the books and ladders usually employed in cases of fire are good for nothing. With regard to the first complaint, it is evident to all that our correspondent is right, and a more disgraceful want can hardly be named, and we have no doubt that "Nobody's" assertion is equally correct.—If all the other wants and negligences which at present exist in the good Town of Kingston, were to be pointed as clearly as those, to which we have now alluded have been, it is very probable that the necessity of an Act of Incorporation would receive a general and efficient advocacy.

We regret to have to state the death of Mr. Needham, of the township of Kingston, in consequence of having his hands and feet frozen some time ago, while exposed to the night frost.

**THE GREAT FIRE.**

The Conflagration.—The ruins are now smoking over a little more than fifty-two acres. The number of buildings varying from 500 to 700, embracing the fairest portion of our city. Great as has been the loss, we are persuaded it has been put down at from twenty to thirty millions, and it has been said that all the Insurance offices are ruined. We believe the actual loss has been doubled, and that a large portion of the offices will pay all their losses and have a surplus left. The loss will fall very heavy on foreign merchants and on distant citizens, as many of the commission merchants hold their goods merely on consignment. We turn our eyes first to the man who has lost his house; but the fact is that every person in our city is a sufferer. The man of fortune has lost his stock. We know of one individual who has lost in stock and goods nearly half a million.

The whole work of destruction to the Merchant's Exchange was done in an hour and twenty minutes.

Hughes' fine statue of Alexander Hamilton is among the valuable articles buried deep beneath the ruins of the Exchange.

Among the ruins of the Exchange, the Jersey Little Falls Co. dug out their Iron Chest, containing \$25,000 in bills—all secure.

Well done Philadelphia.—A large detachment of Philadelphia firemen, with their engines, hose and badges, arrived here this morning, from our sister city—to aid and relieve our own. This is indeed nobly done. Let them be received as friends in the hour of calamity should be.

We learn that the City Fire Insurance Company having lost no more than half their capital, which is \$500,000, are continuing their business as usual.

From the Journal of Commerce of Saturday.

All the papers whose offices were burned or damaged by the fire, have re-commenced their issues. These are the Journal of Commerce, the Gazette, the Daily Advertiser, the Times and the American.

The derangements in the Post Office in consequence of the fire have been so great, that as yet the clerks have been unable to make up any newspaper mails, and of course subscribers in the country will be greatly disappointed by the delay in the receipt of their papers. For the same reason our citizens, since the fire, have been kept quite ignorant of what is going on in the country. Until last evening we were unable to obtain a single paper from the Post Office, and it will be some days longer before its affairs will be restored to their wonted order.—When practicable, we have sent our papers by other conveyances than the mails.

It has been mentioned that the conflagration of Wednesday night was seen by passengers coming down the Hudson, at a distance of 45 miles from the city. What is still more remarkable is, that it was seen at New Haven, a distance of eighty-four miles from this city. So we are informed by a friend who was in New Haven.

Plundering at the Fire.—The Police Officers were all day yesterday engaged in recovering property which was stolen at the fire; and have brought to the Police Office upwards of \$20,000 worth, chiefly in dry goods. The Police Office was crowded all day with persons in search of their property, and several found articles these belonging to them.
