These courts are to be held as often as the commissioners see fit, and each commissioner and the town clerk is entitled to receive five shillings per day (for every day charged by them,) from the District Treasurer, and their accounts to be audited at the next town mseting; query, by whom? Whether the local affairs of the several townships will be better managed under this act, than they formerly were, remains yet to be seen. One thing, however, is pretty certain, that it will require a large part of the funds of the several District treasurers to pay the commissioners and town clerks their wages-take for example the Midland District; there are, I believe, eighteen organized townships in it,-allowing that these courts meet only twice in a month, (which is quite a moderate estimate) at twenty shillings per day for each court; this will amount to four hundred and twelve pounds for one year (exclusive of the several town clerks, lees for other matters,) all to be drawn from the district treasury.

In conclusion. I would ask these reform gentry who pretend to be so careful of people's rights and money, why they did not allow of an appeal to a jury in cases where a party might feel aggrieved?-why they did not require delinquents to pay the costs of prosecution, instead of granting the "people's" money for that purpose? and whether some of the new townships will not draw more money from the public funds of the District, than the amount contributed to the same by their rates and assessments? This act being one on which the reformers pride themselves a good deal, I shall say no more about it at present, only that I think the clause limiting its duration to four years will ere long be considered the best one contained in it.
