Lovalists' Rights and Militia Claimants, respectfully recommend, that the suggestions of His Excellency be adopted, and that the Deeds do issue in the names of the original Granters, to all persons who have received Location Tickets. as U. E. Loyalists or Militia Claimants, without further delay.
