The Clergymen are resorting to filing bills in the Court of Exchequer, as the only probable means left them of collecting their tithes; and consequently the defaulters dreading the expense attendant on such proceedings are now beginning to pay the amount, some of which is due, for the last three years. The following is an extract from a letter written by a respectable Attorney in Dublin:-"Billa filed by the Protestant Clergy at the rate of 300 a day for tithe."

Mr. O'Connell and Mr. Thomas Moore .-Though for some time aware of the circumstance, we have hitherto forborne to allude ta a correspondence which has taken place between Mr. O'Connell and Mr. T. Moore, on the subject of certain expressions alleged to have been used by the latter, in reference to Mr. O'Connell, at a dinner given during the last season, at Lady Blessington's; and we only make reference to the correspondence now to state, that after a candid explanation between Mr. Moore and Mr. O'Connell, every unpleasant impression is removed from the mind of the latter .- [Dublin paper.

A strange story lately appeared in the London Times, of the detention of the Hon. Edwin Lindsay, a brother of the Earl of Balcarras, in the Island of Papa, one of the Shetland group. It was stated that he was cruelly treated by persons employed to keep him there, and that several attempts to get blm away had been thwarted. The reason for his detention was not given. It is said Mr. Lindsay is in London, and that he declares he has been 25 years in the island, having been most cruelly used there. He is now 50 years old, and was formerly in the Madras military service. [Lord Balcarras, the brother of Mr. Lindsay, has published in the London papers of Saturday, a statement to the effect that he (Mr. L.) was not perfectly sane, that he was discovered by some society for the relief of distress in the Island of Papa where be resided comfortably in the house of a most respectable gentleman, and taken to London, that they will not say where he is, and that the matter will probably come before the courts.]

Hydrophobia .- A most distressing case of death from hydrophobia recently occurred at Kingawinford. The deceased, Mary Green, who was a married woman, and advanced in pregnancy, was passing, with her husband, along Mill lane at Brierly Hill, on the 12th of July last, when a terrior dog made an attempt to bite her husband, but did not succeed. He then turned upon the deceased, and bit her on the left heel and the leg. Medical assistance was immediately resorted to and in about three weeks the wounds healed and she went to her usual daily work, apparently in good health. On the 7th ult, she lay in and was her confinement no symptoms of hydrophobia were evident; they then appeared in their most dreadful shape, and continued until the 18th ult. when death terminated the agonies of the sufferer.
