Loyalists' Rights and Militia Claimants, respecttors united on the 7th Oct. last, and merged in fully recommend, that the suggestions of His Excellency be adopted, and that the Deeds do issue in the names of the original Grantees, to isfies all the favourable expectations that were all persons who have received Location Tickets, as U. E. Loyalists or Militia Claimants, without further delay. And it is also recoinmended, that in future certain Townships may he set apart for the location of this description of persons, who may be authorised to receive Free Grants on account of their U. E. Loyal- July, Joseph & Peter ist or Militia Claims, and that the Deeds shall issue in the names of the Grantees respectively, at the time of their location.

These Regulations, made for the purpose of adjusting the question, which, for the interest of the Province, it is considered should not longer remain unsettled, are not to prevent U. E. Loyal sts or Militia Claimants entitled to grants of land, from settling in other Townships, provided that they wish to occupy their own Locations, and to take up their residence

It is further recommended, that the Surveyor General be instructed to publish this order.

* NOTE .- The following definition the author has attached to his original term presstraction: - The natural power that causes bodies to approach each other, without any sensible cause, through the clastic medium, electric pressure. The verb presstract seemingly carries a contradiction, (press-draw.) as the real and apparent cause producing gravity involves a contradiction. Therefore, the author thinks that presstraction is the most appropriate term to represent the principle of gravity. The above work, as far as it involves electricity, will be endorsed (through citation.) by the spirit of the philosophy of Franklin, relative to his electrical experiments, to establish the principles; but the applications, however, are entirely origi-
