Loyalists' Rights and Militia Claimants, respectfully recommend, that the suggestions of His Excellency be adopted, and that the Deeds do issue in the names of the original Grantees, to all persons who have received Location Tickets, as U. E. Loyalists or Militia Claimants, without further delay. And it is also recommended, that in future certain Townships may be set apart for the location of this description of persons, who may be authorised to receive Free Grants on account of their U. E. Loyalist or Militia Claims, and that the Deeds shall issue in the names of the Grantees respective-

ly, at the time of their location. These Regulations, made for the purpose of adjusting the question, which, for the interest of the Province, it is considered should not longer remain unsettled, are not to prevent U. E.
