

and which I think, if acted upon, would materially improve the morals and condition of our army, with very little expense to government, and lead to the ranks of men of superior standing in society, and ultimately annul in our service the disgusting punishment of the lash.

In answer to the question, "Could not a more respectable class of men be obtained for the army by recruiting?" I say certainly not, composed as it is at present, for no young man of respectability, or at all in easy circumstances, will enlist, knowing that he would afterwards have to associate with some of the dregs of society. I therefore suggest that no man be taken as a recruit who was not well known in the parish where he offered himself, and whose character would not bear a little scrutiny. It may be urged by some, that the army could not be kept up by such a system, but upon its present reduced establishment I have not the least doubt but it could; besides, by rejecting the vicious, the disgraceful crime of desertion would be much less frequent, and before an augmentation may be required, such a reformation may have taken place as to put beyond the power of corruption, when a "superior class of men" would feel no objection to, or consider themselves disgraced by, entering the ranks of our army; thereby preventing a set of worthless rascals entering into our present system, no man is recorded who is considered physically fit for a soldier, no matter how depraved his morals may be. I would also suggest that the parents of, or next of kin to the recruit be entered in his Attestation and Pocket Ledger, so that if necessary they might be written to by the man's pay-sergeant, explaining his character and conduct, and a knowledge of which I think would deter many from vice, and suitable admonition from friends might reclaim those who had fallen into it.

As a stimulus to gallantry and good conduct, two military Orders of Merit should be established, one for the former, which should be delivered to the soldier as soon after the performance of his gallant conduct as convenient; and another for the latter, which should be given to all such men as had served faithfully for ten years, without having had their names inserted in the Regimental Defaulter Book—in both cases to be delivered on parade in presence of the regiment.

The non-commissioned officers are a body of men upon whom a multiplicity of duties devolve, and who are at times placed in situations of great responsibility, and with whom in a great measure the interior economy or discipline of a regiment depend; therefore as another inducement to good conduct, and of encouragement to them to persevere in a faithful performance of their various duties, I think their pay to the infantry ought to be increased to the following rates, viz:

Serjeant Major,	s. d.

Color Sergeant,	3	6

In all cases of misconduct, stop the delinquent's pay as far as practicable, and which should be so arranged as to be done without resorting to Courts Martial.

There appears an absurdity in our present Canteen system; spirits being retained to the soldier at his barracks room door, for drinking which he subjects himself to trial by Garrison Court Martial; for in four cases out of every five (particularly with Englishmen) where a single gill is taken they are more or less intoxicated; and I have generally observed that those drunk from spirit drinking, are more fractious and disorderly than those in a similar state from drinking ale, therefore I would banish spirits from the walls of a barracks as evil spirits, and permit nothing drinkable to be sold at the Canteen except Ale, Porter, Cider, and Wine, the whole of which should be of the best quality.

The officers in our service, I am proud to say, are gentlemen, and generally speaking, men of family and fortune, but to them I think it necessary that something should be said, for I think they have not sufficient intercourse with their men; for they seldom approach them except to command, find fault with, or award punishments, thereby placing themselves in rather an unfavorable position with the soldier, to whom, and the service, I think it would be a benefit were they occasionally to be seen among them prompting and encouraging them in their amusements, or to some manly exercise.

As an inducement to men to spend more of their leisure time in barracks, instead of resorting to public houses for amusement, where they pick up habits of vice and intemperance, I would suggest that a large building be erected within the boundary of every barracks, the lower part of which should be more or less open to the sides according to climate, (which might be used as a drill room in bad weather,) where the men could amuse themselves in a variety of ways when off parade—the upper part divided into apartments and fitted up as a library, (provided in the first instance at the public expense,) or reading room, school, and accommodation for the school master, who would be the librarian—the exterior ends of the building formed into racket or fives courts, and having the soldier as far as possible the means of bodily and mental recreation at hand.

In conclusion, I beg to say that I believe our army is so well paid and provided for as the British, and could the abominable propensity to drunkenness be overcome, crime would cease, and they would be justly the first troops in the world.

The object of the foregoing remarks is to expose the material of the army, and prevent the same as far as practicable, and should the service generally, or the soldier individually, be satisfied by them, it will afford much gratification to me.

**Emigration.**—The tide of emigration runs strongly this year. Already have five vessels sailed from this harbor, and our quays are daily crowded with multitudes preparing to take their departure for the New World. Canada seems to be the general destination.—Two of those vessels which have sailed on Tuesday, carried on nearly 400 passengers.—[Cork Constitution.

The winter in the North of Europe has been one of great rigor. At Moscow the mercury had been as low as 35 below zero, of Reaumur. On the 23d of January, the day of the greatest cold, a sentinel was frozen at his post, and a sledge arrived drawn by four horses, but the driver of which, with two travellers, had been frozen on their journey.

Since noon on Sunday the weather has been the roughest, wettest, and most ungenial that has ever been remembered during the last week of May, attended with intense cold and a high easterly wind. Almost all the vessels in port reached the city from Quebec with the wind, in an unusual short period. The waters have risen to an unparalleled height, and the passengers to and from the Britannia were conveyed yesterday in carts and caresses, the waters having covered the wharves. The markets have consequently risen to an extraordinary extent, and are ill supplied even with the necessaries of life. Vegetation is suspended, and apprehensions seriously entertained for such Spring crops as have been sown.—[Irish Advocate.
