We copy from yesterday's Herald, with some slight alterations, the proceedings of the meeting of the merchants, traders, and other inhabitants of this good old town, Kingston, which was held and numerously and respectfully attended at the Court House on Monday last, for the purpose of considering the propriety of soliciting the establishment of a Branch of "The Bank of British North America" here.

We attended, and took part in the proceedings of the meeting, deeming the subject of essential importance to the community, for we confess ourselves faithfully & spontaneously to be in favour of, and free and healthy circulation of sound British capital, although it may be, and often is, termed foreign capital.

In noticing the respectable attendance at the meeting, it was very gratifying to see several of the Directors and other officers of the existing monied institutions, some of whom, with characteristic frankness, and an disposition to oppose the proceedings, debated the subject with candour and fairness; and it argues favorably for those proceedings as well as creditably to the individual himself, to see John Strang, Esq., the respected Vice-President of the Commercial Bank of the Midland District, yield to the unanimous call of the meeting to take the chair, giving thereby evidence of the absence of those selfish petty interests which would be supposed to impede the progress of a just and equitable measure.

Very few and very slight were the objections raised, and those few were satisfactorily answered by Mr. Maanahan, who proposed the several Resolutions, and prefaced each with some pertinent remarks.

The unconstitutionality of establishing Banks in the Colonies under Royal Charters, or Imperial Legislation, was urged, but only in such a temper and spirit as to give the question for future discussion before the public; but we presume that the Board of Directors will not omit making application to the Provincial Parliaments for Acts of Incorporation in every Province where a Bank may be established, if gained, well and good; if refused, then Imperial Legislation may be resorted to.

Presumptions were raised that the capital stock subscribed in England would be kept there—and that the profits accruing from a credit business in the Colonies would be transmitting in specie to Great Britain to be divided amongst the shareholders there—and that it would be preferable to charter banks in the provinces, within which, it is now allowed, there is abundance of idle capital for all requisite purposes. Charter banks we say, the more the merrier—but we are strongly opposed to any thing like monopoly in money matters, or favoritism in monied institutions, and without a fair and honorable competition by bringing money like any other commodity into the market, Colonial Banks will never be cured of the evils we deprecate.

For the information of the Midland District Land Company.

The following communications were read at a meeting of the Land Company held at the Court House in Kingston, on Saturday 25th July, 1836.

A brief sketch of the quantity of Wild Land in the District, and of what has already been done in endeavoring to open roads through the same, with the Company's views thereon, may be here proper and useful in submitting the subject for His Excellency's consideration.

There are many Townships of Land unoccupied, in the rear of the Midland District of this Province, extending in a Square Block of about fifty miles, containing more than half a million of acres, which are at present unproductive to the Empire, as well as a hindrance to the prosperity of the District.

The Company are now prepared to enter upon such arrangements as His Excellency may be pleased to point out, towards purchasing all the Crown Lands, which may on examination be found fit for cultivation, as well as all the Clergy Reserves and School Lands which may be for sale in the Midland District.

In order to bring His Excellency fully acquainted with all the information the Company possess respecting the settlement of these lands, I am authorized to state that the Company have had the honor to receive from His Excellency the Governor, and laying them open for the reception of Emigrants from the Mother Country; if so, the Company will render their ready assistance to the Government Authorities who may be charged with that duty.

The accompanying Map will show the Townships unoccupied, in the Midland District, and the red line will show the route of proposed Road through the same.

Sir,—I have the honor to inform you that your Letter of the 16th February last, as Agent for the Midland District Land Company, with an application from A. Maanahan, Esq., on behalf of Magistrates of the Midland District, on the same subject, was read in Council, on the 4th instant, when the following minute was made thereon, and approved by His Excellency the Lieut. Governor.

The Provincial Legislature at its last Session addressed His Majesty on the subject of the general sale of the Land granting Government act upon that Address, the Council deem it inexpedient to make any local arrangement. And the Council contemplating a general modification of the land granting system, cannot recommend it in relation to the Midland District as a matter of separate consideration.
