

and deposit, with capital to the extent of Five Millions of sound British Capital, and the great improvements it contemplates will give it the World, large as the world may be. Let the issues consequent on five millions of sound capital be healthily circulated, and you may write our motto—"sic ut satius Oedrus apud Libanum." The British Steamship will have a strong hold and a strong arm in this single possession capable of sustaining her in peace or at war for centuries to come. Royal Charters or Legislative enactments are anonymous in legalizing such institutions. At present, however, and to save this trouble, could you find capital to carry on an extent beyond £50,000 sterling, to carry on a Bank under the Act of Incorporation which I obtained for the Marmora Foundry Co., Banking business to any desirable extent could be legally, and I am sure also profitably, carried on under it. The merits of this Charter are no limitation of time, no loss of account, no compulsion to carry on any business if not found profitable—the Foundry business all the qualities that legalize it and its possession all the qualities that legalize the most favored Charters—it has a common seal, can sue and be sued, and is recognized as a public act in the Province—and, in fact, is prohibited in nothing, except, to exemplify the characteristic hatred of Marshall Spring Bidwell to every rational improvement on British principle, and especially to mark his condemnation of British North American and Canada Land Companies in holding Real Estate at any time exceeding £50,000. They think it could be purchased from the present proprietor, the Honorable Peter McGill, of Montreal, for £20,000, and, considering that the Estate consists of 13,000 acres of land and upwards, I deem them worth much more. It is superfluous to state to you the position or advantage of the works themselves, or the value of the several buildings connected with them. You have seen them, and you are aware that Mr. Hayes, the former proprietor, laid out £277,000 in the works alone. A good deal of that was judiciously expended—but although it was so by him, and operated as it always does, unfavorably to him, myself, and those other unfortunates, whose capital he worked upon, yet the very injudiciousness of expenditure condemnable in him, will be of solid advantage to the future owners. It might take between £2,500 and £3,000 of ready money capital to organize the works and carry on some operations before the full aggrandizement of the Company, or before a foreign Company could well commence Banking operations—as well as to insure further grants of Land from the Government for their support. Upon a ready money or fixed credit, capital to the extent of £50,000 more, as Banking Capital, I venture to hazard an opinion that as great a return of profit would accrue as from any other funded stock in America. Indeed I would not be afraid to name 20 per cent. as the annual dividend after the third year.

You, my dear Sir, are aware of the flattering returns given to Stockholders in the various Joint Stock Companies in this Province, especially from Banking companies—and it establishes a faith in my opinions, that the several Banks (it appears to me the more numerous the more profitable) have declared more than eight per centum per annum on the second years' operations, more to amuse the Stockholders with. Another proof is the high premium the several stocks bear in the Colonial market. The Montreal is the maximum, being at 25 per cent., and the Commercial Bank Stock the minimum, being only 3 years in operation, bearing 15 per centium.

Judging of the probability of your being again called upon to give opinions on Colonial Banking matters by influential and monied men, during your proposed sojourn in London for another season, I desire to put you in possession of my crude ideas, and to urge you to point out, with the force and clearness so peculiarly your talent, the untold benefits that would accrue to them and to us, from the sound investment of Capital in this Province; and should you feel any other important subjects affecting this our adopted country, I shall feel much pleasure in communicating in reply, fairly and fearlessly, my candid opinions to you.

**FARTIES IN BOTH PROVINCES.**

While the illiberal and oppressive majority of the late House of Assembly was high in power, and threatened to continue unchecked, in the work of division and subversion, for at least two years to come, we often regretted the intimate union which subsisted between its members and the radicals in Lower Canada. We watched the workings of the deep laid scheme between the two factions—saw them uniting their energies and striving with undivided effort for the attainment of objects in which they felt a mutual interest. Their communion was first covert, and denied, but as they grew in fancied strength and felt that their standing was secure, they threw the cloak aside, and unblushingly avowed their combinations. They openly expressed mutual sympathy and professed their readiness to co-operate in the work of subversion, excision, revolution. Then, indeed, the friends of excitement in both Provinces, with despotism arrogance arose in the ascendancy, and like a magic mountain cast a dark, a death-like shadow on the surrounding scene.—The farther their disastrous influence spread, the farther followed the disastrous obscuration. Their power, however rapturous it was, must have had the brevity of human rapture. Here they agitated the elements till their own dissolution followed from their own deeds—they shook the foundations of our institutions 'till their own foundation yielded to the shock, and precipitated them into the oblivion nothingness from which they sprang. Let all successive legislators keep their history and their fate continually in view, and avoid the rock on which they split.

But now that the revolutionary banner that waved in proud triumph, is laid low in the dust, and the radical band scattered to the four winds of Heaven! What now are we to say of the once dreaded union between faction here and faction in Lower Canada? That union we now hail with pleasure and rejoice that it existed. If they mutually gloried in their successes, they may now mutually sympathize in their adversity—if the triumph of a faction here gave life, and energy, and hope to the Palladium party in the Sister Province, the utter defeat of that same faction will now afford cause for very different feelings. The signal justice which was meted out to the disturbers of the public peace in this Province, and which in its mighty sweep levelled the bulwarks of the enemy, and carried desolation and dismay into their midst, extends its influence to the co-operating party in Lower Canada. The factionists there have suffered a bitter, mortifying

and defeat in the issue of our Elections. They were as much interested as though the contest was their own, and so it virtually was, for the revolutionists in this and in the Sister Province are one in heart, one in action, and one in all the objects and aims that excite and animate the destructionist. Papineau, the General of the Host, may now weep over the defeat of those in whom he placed his chief confidence, and may rely upon suffering a similar fate whenever intelligence and truth shall have spread sufficiently to awaken the people. To this he must eventually come, and although the retribution may be deferred, yet it will not be the less certain or overwhelming.

The avowed intimate union existing between the Papineau faction and the radicals here, has been the means of effecting a union we trust equally as strong and enduring as it is just and necessary between the friends of British supremacy in both provinces. This union, called into open and avowed existence by necessity, may be now kept up with profit, and with some effort and organization may tend to bring about a political regeneration in the sister province. The triumph of radicalism here has had its influence upon Lower Canada, and we may now hope that an influence of a different character will be exerted to cheer, and animate, and strengthen, and perpetuate the constitutional cause. To effectually secure the triumph of good principle in the sister province, it is only necessary that the Home Government should change the policy pursued, and forever discontinue that tame temporizing course pursued by Lord Gosford, and adopt towards the French faction a system of action at once prompt, vigorous, and just. Then, and not till then, will the malcontents be silenced, suppressed and governed.

The Steam Packet Canada, Capt. Johnson, has discontinued her regular trips between this Town and Oswego, and has gone below to bring up the St. George. When this benevolent design shall have been accomplished, the Canada will resume her trips as heretofore.

Some idea of the extent of the company may be formed from the fact that there are upwards of 60 men and horses.
