UNITED LINES OF THE RIDEAU AND ST. LAWRENCE.

THE OTTAWA AND RIDEAU FORWARDING COMPANY beg leave to notify their friends and the public generally, that they have United their Line with that of the Canada Inland Forwarding and Insurance Company.

1. On the connection between the language and the character of a people.

3. On the circumstances which affect climate in general, and the climate of Lower Canada in particular.

4. On the comparative adaptation of prairie and forest to the settlement of a new country.

5. The changes that have taken place in the habits of exotic plants cultivated in the northern parts of America, particularly as regards the changes induced on their agricultural and horticultural products.

1st. The Essays shall be presented on or before the 20th of February, 1837.

2d. The Essay may be in French or English.

3d. MISCELLANEOUS.

MR. RATHBUN.

The following letter gives all the particulars relative to the failure, and forgeries of Mr. Rathbun, that had transpired at the time when it was written, and more than are furnished by the Buffalo papers.

Correspondence of the Commercial Advertiser. Buffalo, Aug. 4, 1836.

Before this reaches you, common fame will have announced the failure of Benjamin Rathbun, of our city, whom your papers have pronounced the "Girard of the West."

The prominent situation of Mr. R., the magnitude of the failure, the painful circumstances connected with it, taken in connection with the effect which it may have on the public mind abroad in relation to the interests of this city, induce me to detail to you such facts as have come to my knowledge.

For the last few days reports of an alarming nature had been in circulation relative to the amount of Rathbun's paper, endorsed by our principal citizens, which had been or was in market in New York. The arrival, last Saturday evening, of an agent from New York, to secure certain demands against Mr. R. led to the disclosure of the alarming fact, that nearly all the endorsements on his notes were forgeries. The disclosure of this fact to a few of our discreet and wealthy citizens, satisfied them that his failure was inevitable; and immediate measures were taken to induce him to make an assignment of his property for the benefit of his creditors, which was completed on Monday evening.

On Tuesday commenced the great land sale at Niagara Falls, in which Mr. R. was deeply interested. The assignees being desirous that the benefit of that sale might accrue to the creditors, permitted him to attend it on Tuesday and Wednesday; but about noon on Wednesday, some of the assignees becoming alarmed at the fearful extent of the responsibility which they had assumed, took possession of the keys of the vaults. About the same time also, reports of the forgeries began to circulate. This alarmed Lyman Rathbun, the brother of Benjamin, and his chief financier, who despatched a messenger to apprise his brother of the crisis, and immediately left the city himself.

Prompt measures were then taken to secure the goods and property in the various stores, workshops, ware-houses, barns, &c., all of which was effectually done and cheerfully acquiesced in by some two thousand individuals in his employ, although thrown out of business for the present.

Measures were immediately taken by the police to arrest both of the Rathbuns; and their returning to the city during the night, were secured, and are now in jail. Every thing that sound judgment and perseverance could accomplish, has been done by the assignees, to secure the property, and they have already commenced the Herculean task of executing their trust.

My dear sir, did you wish any consolation to me in this affair was most painful. To commit my friend, whom I have known and esteemed for the last sixteen years, as a kind and benevolent neighbor, a public-spirited citizen, and a uniform friend to good order, to commit such a man as a felon, would make you act the woman. But justice required it—the character of our city required it. The facts which transpired on the examinations, and have come to my knowledge since, have utterly astonished me. First, as to the amount of the forgeries, which no doubt far exceed a million of dollars. Probably about seven-tenths of the amount have been disposed of east, and the balance west of this city. Indeed I believe he can comparatively have but little genuine paper about, or in bank. It is ascertained that the name of Daniel E. Evans has been forged to paper exceeding two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the names of several of our respectable citizens to a very large amount each. About seventy thousand dollars of Mr. R.'s paper is in one bank in Ohio, every dollar of which is probably forged. And what appears marvellous in this transaction, several thousand dollars of forged endorsements are held by brokers in our own city, the counterfeit so perfect, and the payment so punctual, that it has not been discovered, although such paper has been in market weekly, if not daily, for the last eighteen months.

This failure, although of such an immense magnitude, will not, to any serious extent, affect the prosperity of this city. The loss, if any, will not be great, and will principally fall on the rich. I learn that the assignment, first, provides for his workmen of all classes; next, those who furnished materials for buildings, &c.—that the laboring classes are provided for. Further details in relation to the assignment have not come to my knowledge, but I am informed by the assignees, whose integrity will not be questioned, that the provision for all classes of creditors is not only equitable but unexceptionable.—The cash value of the real and personal estate, I cannot pretend to estimate, but, an confident it will exceed two millions of dollars; and should the times be favorable for closing the concern, all the creditors may be paid even including the holders of forged paper. A large portion of the real estate is located near the centre of the city, and will always command high prices and a ready sale. It may be supposed abroad that so large a failure will affect the price of real estate in the city. Or judging from some articles which have appeared in some of the cas-

ters papers, it might be apprehended that the failure of Mr. Rathbun would be the failure of the city. A few weeks will prove such opinions totally unfounded. His place as a builder will no doubt in a month be supplied by fifty others, his stores soon re-supplied with goods, and all his other interests fall into the hands of men of sound capital. And if hereafter we do not make so much noise abroad, we must be content with the name we have always sustained, of commercial integrity and solvency.

From the Alexandria Gazette.

Our correspondent, A. B. has performed an acceptable service in collecting the facts which he embodies in what may be called his 'Thoughts on the Present Discontents,' and in giving utterance to his reflections upon the progress of disaffection to the laws and the general decline of public virtue. If "History be philosophy teaching by example," how awful are the warnings and terrible the lessons of the history even of our own times and our own country! Look at the picture presented by our correspondent, and see how strong are the symptoms of decay of national morality, and consequently of national happiness and greatness! Nor ought any man to shut his eyes to the real state of the case. "To be forewarned is to be forearmed." Possibly by having attention aroused to the facts, a salutary reform may be brought about in the minds, tempers, and dispositions of the people, and a correction may be applied to the great evil.

Even by those who may not acquiesce in all the opinions expressed in the essay of our correspondent, with regard to the cases cited, the general conclusions to which he arrives must be admitted. All must acquiesce in the justice of the moral deduction.
