Resolved, 1. That it appears, from statements submitted to this meeting, that a Railroad through the Seignory of Beauharnois, would combine the two essential objects of opening the shortest and cheapest route from Lachine to Upper Canada, and of connecting such a communication between the Provinces with the Eastern States, Lake Champlain, and the settlements on the Provincial Line by the projected Rail-road, for which a Law has been obtained from the Legislature of New York, &c.

2. That the distance from Lachine to Cornwall, now performed with difficulty and inconvenience in fifteen hours, might be performed with ease and comfort by this route in much less than half that time.

3. That the length of the Railroad between Beauharnois and Lake St. Francis, with a sufficient allowance for a divergence from the straight line to strike the nearest point on the St. Louis to Huntingdon, would not exceed fifteen or at most sixteen miles—that the country is perfectly level, affords every facility from abundance of labor and materials of every description and that no expensive cuttings, viaducts, or bridges, would be required.

4. That although estimates have not been prepared of the expense of this part of the proposed undertaking, there is every ground for believing from surveys made and levels taken for a canal in the same direction, the Rail-road from Beauharnois to Lake St. Francis can be completed, with two superior steam-boats, &c. provided considerably under the amount of £50,000.

5. That it is expedient to form a Company in the first instance, for the accomplishment of this part of the proposed undertaking, and that application be made to the Legislature, for a Bill to incorporate such Company under the title of the "Beauharnois Railroad Company."

6. That the capital in the first instance be £50,000, with power to increase it to £100,000, or such sum as may be adequate to the purpose, either by adding to the share of the first subscribers, or by admitting fresh subscribers, when it shall be deemed advisable to undertake the branch Road to join the railroad from Ogdensburgh to Plattsburgh.

7. That the original capital be divided into 4000 shares of \$50 each.

8. That Lawrence George Brown, Esq., be the first Chairman, and—

9. That a competent Civil Engineer be forthwith selected by the gentlemen now named as Directors, and employed to make surveys and plans of the proposed railroad, and to report upon the most eligible spot for its termination, either on the River St. Lawrence or on Lake St. Francis—having always in view commodious ports on the Lake or River for Steamboats and other vessels.

10. That Mr. Le Blanc be employed to act as temporary Secretary, and to prepare and issue such notices as may be necessary.

**THE ARMY.**  
Lieut. General Sir John Colborne has, we learn, signified his intention of being here on Wednesday next, and of seeing the three Regiments of the Line, in Brigade, on the Plains of Abraham on the following day, the garrison duties being taken by the Royal Artillery. This will not be a military spectacle, such as we have not lately seen many opportunities of witnessing in Canada, where, except at head-quarters, it is seldom that a whole regiment can be brought together for the purpose of review. A brigade field day will therefore prove, even to the inhabitants of the first fortress in North America, an attractive novelty, and should the weather prove fine, we have no doubt that a numerous company will be present drawn together as the military parade is to take a last look at that gallant and distinguished corps, the 79th Highlanders, in full array of their splendid national costume.—[Quebec Mercury, Saturday.]

The entire of the service companies, 1st Royals, embarked on the *Midland* at Cork, on Tuesday last. We are not at all surprised to learn two officers, thirty men, and some women and children have been left behind, there being no accommodation for them on board, as 400 men have been the usual number allotted to this vessel, and she has now 530 crammed into her. We trust that Sir T. Arbuthnot, who commands the district, will report the circumstance to Horse Guards, and thereby prevent a recurrence of such negligence on the part of the transport department, certainly not the best managed in the service.—[United Service Gazette.]
