The following is a copy of the Address:-To His Excellency Sin Francis Bond Head, Knight Commander of the Royal Hanoverian Quelphin Goder, and of the Prosine Miletary Order of Merit, Lieutenant Governor of the Premince of Upper Canada, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We, His Majesty's most dutiful and Loyal Subjects, inhabitants of the town of Perth, respectfully beg leave to welcome Your Excellency to this part of the Province, and to assure Your Excellency, that we duly appreciate your early anxiety to visit the remote Settlements, by which an opportunity is afforded to Your Excellency of witnessing the local improvements which may be in progress, or which it may be important to promote, for the ships of Lower Canada enjoy as favourable a comfort and prosperity of the people.

That Your Excellency may enjoy health and a pleasant journey is our most garnest de-

Perth, August 29, 1836.

REPLY,

His Excellency replied, that he felt very much gratified by the cordial reception which the inhabitants of Perch had given him, and by the good wishes which they had been pleased to convey to him in their Address .-He observed, that he did feel a deep interest in the prosperity of the people of the Province and particularly those in the remote settlements, and he hoped that the time had arrived when the people would unite their energies for the public welfare-that all political differences would be forgotten, and that they would look at each other as brethren .- He said, he was happy to observe how much had been done by the public spirited inhabitants of the Town in the erection of their public buildings, | Charge d' Affairs at the Court of Brazil. which he understood were put up at private expense. > > CLIMATE OF THE CANADAS. To the Editor of the Montreal Herald.

Sin,-My present object in addressing you is to expose the supineness of the press in both provinces the Quebec Gazette excepted, on the state of the weather. There are few subjects so interesting as a weekly diary of the weather, state of the ground, sowing, reaping, appearance of the crops, &c.; and none would conduce more to bring a newspaper into notice and increase its circulation. A great deal has been said in favour of the climate of the Upper Province, but it is difficult to form a correct estimate of the comparative advantages of Upper and Lower Canada as regards climate, owing to the negligence of the press. I have lived in both provinces, and on my own practical experience I can state, that the townclimate for farming, as any part of Upper Ca-nada; and, although the winter is much longer in the Lower Province, still the ground is as early ready for the plough and the spade as in the Upper. In the Lower Province the ground is deeply covered with snow during the whole of the winter, which prevents the frost from getting more than two or three inches below the surface, so that as soon as the spring of the year arrives and the snow melts. the ground is ready for culture. In the Upper Province the ground is bare a great part of the winter, and, consequently, the frost gets so far below the surface that a much longer time is required to extract it.
