THE GALT LETTERS.
From the Cobourg Star.
In this number we publish Letter 3d of Mr. Galt's series on projects of improvement in Upper Canada.

My Lord—I wish I could light upon any opportunity wherein I might show my readiness to serve, and shew my gratitude for the regards that you have honored me with. Will ye give me something to do? Here I pass a sort of half-idle scribble life, tending a trifling trade, that scarce affords me the needful.

Free twenty-five to five and forty
My muse was nought sweeter nor dory;
My Pegasus had break his tether,
Even at the wagging of a feather,
And throw ideas scur like drift,
Streering his wings up to the Lift.

The following will be immediately recognized as a true description of the incidents so skillfully and powerfully wrought up, by Walter Scott, in "The Heart of Mid Lothian."

On the Sunday preceding, viz. the 11th, the two condemned criminals, Wilson and Robertson, were taken as usual by four Sergeants out of prison to hear their last sermon, and Wilson, who was a very strong fellow, took Robertson by the head of his breeks and threw him out of the seat, held a Soger fast in each hand, and one of them with his teeth, while Robertson got over and throw the pews, pushed o'er the elder and plate at the door, made his escape throw the Parl.

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of witnesses to fix the guilt upon him. The uproar of a mob increased with the loud din that ever was heard, and would have torn him, Council and Guard, all in pieces, if the magistrates had not sent him to the Tolbooth by a strong party, and told him he should be tried for his life, which gave them some satisfaction and sent them quietly home. I could have acted more discreetly had I been in Porteus's place.

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"Mr. Morris, by his proprietorial right to five hundred thousand acres, and by the right of pre-emption became as soon as he had obtained the concession of the Indians, possessor of nearly three millions of acres of forest, and it is from that vast speculation that subsequently, Sir William Pulteney, the Holland Company, Mr. Parish, and others acquired their lands under which the Genesee settlements have been made.

"It is admitted on all hands, with respect to the inferior purchases, that in the commencement great errors were committed. These the Canada Company, profiting by their experience, may avoid. One of the earliest agents of the Holland Company, a Colonel Boone, began, it is said, by erecting large establishments for manufacturing maple sugar all the year round!!! Mr. Williamson, to whose care the Pulteney purchase was assigned, acted better, but still, it is said with injudicious prodigality, in so much that at one time it was, I am told, a question with the heirs of Sir William Pulteney whether the whole speculation should not be abandoned; subsequently, however, on examining further into what Mr. Williamson had done, they changed their minds and even made a provision of £20,000 for his family.

The Holland Company having mixed itself with loans, it is now (1825) difficult to say what are its profits; but in so far as the Lauds are concerned, they have become greatly productive;—nor can the lands of Mr. Parish be considered by themselves. The effect of other speculations have made them not productive. The general result, however, has been greatly successful. During a period not exceeding thirty years a wilderness has been settled with a population of more than five hundred thousand souls, many large and flourishing towns have arisen, no less it has been computed at this time than two hundred and twelve, including the villages; extensive Manufactories have been established; a Canal excavated intersecting the State of New York for three hundred and eighty-five miles, opening the navigation from the Lakes of Canada to New York. Since 1825 the progress of the country has been uninterrupted, and I understand is still progressing, and the lands which were contracted for at little more than two shillings an acre, are now selling for four, five, and even seven dollars an acre; in many places at much higher rates.

Provincial Parliament.
BILL
TO ESTABLISH A LOAN AND TRUST COMPANY.
Whereas the establishment of a Loan and Trust Company with a large Capital will promote the agricultural and commercial interests of the Province. Be it therefore enacted &c. That from and after the time this Act shall take effect, John Henry Dunn, George Herchmer Markland, William Allan, Augustus Baldwin, George Crookshanks, John Macaulay, John Hamilton, John Kirby, Joseph Wells, Christopher Widmer, Samuel Street, George Munro, James Newbigging, Joseph Cantwra, John Baldwin, Allan Napier Macnab, Jesse Ketchum, and Charles Coswell Small and their successors be, and they are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate under the name of "The Upper Canada Loan and Trust Company," to be established in the City of Toronto in this Province, and by that name shall have power to contract and be contracted with, may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, answer and be answered unto in all Courts having competent jurisdiction; and may have and use a Common Seal, and the same break, alter and renew at pleasure, and shall be vested with all the powers requisite to adopt by-laws and regulations, and with all privileges necessary to the objects of their incorporation as it is hereinafter defined and limited.
