THE POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT. The Grand Mail Bag was, on the 28th of October last, accidently dropped from the Stage between Bath and Kingston. It was not missed by the Mail-Carrier, until his arrival at this place, when an immediate search was made for it, but the Bag was not discovered until the following morning, when it was found in the possession of a man by the name of Macaulay, who had picked it up, on the road near the floating Bridge, carefully preserved it, and was on his way with it, to the Post Office at Kingston.

The conduct of this man, Macaulay, forms a striking contrast, to that of the persons who, about 18 months since, found the lost Mail Bag, near Matilda. . They were tried for their lives, for rifling and destroying the Mail Bag, while in their possession.

Utica and Gswego Steamboat Conal .- We are pleased to see, (says the N. Y. Commercial Advertiser,) that notice is given of an application to be made to the Legislature at the comming session, to incorporate a company to construct a great canal adapted to lake vessels, from Oswego to Utica. This application, it is understood, is to be made only in case the State should not be disposed to undertake the work. The capital proposed is \$2,000,000; and from estimates and surveys already made, it is believed that the expense will fall much short of this sum, so great are the natural facilities for a canal of this magnitude through the Oswego and Oneida rivers and Oneida lake. These waters, with the exception of a few rapids, requiring but little expense for their improvement, are now navigable for large vessels, and constitute about two thirds of the distance from Oswego to Utica. With such facilities afforded by nature for bringing the trade of the western lakes about 100 miles nearer to this city in their own bottoms, this great work must certainly be undertaken forthwith, either by the State or by private enterprize.
