"Mr. Cartwright had always thought that there was a necessity of altering the place for holding the Court, and considered the Napance Mills as a much better situation than Adolphustown."

I beg most distinctly to say, that the above is not correct, and that I did not vote on the question at all, as I might have been supposed to have been influenced by private motives. I was called upon by one or two members to state my views, when I stated "That according to my opinion, the holding the Court at Kingston would afford more accommodation to a majority of my constituents than its remaining at Adolphustown; that many were anxious that it should be removed to Napanee Mills, but in consequence of my interest being in that place, I did not wish to say a word. That under all circumstances, I thought it most advisable to let it remain at Adolphustown until the County of Hastings should be set off, when the question could be decided." Rodil, and that Gomez and his brother had been taken prisoners, and Cabrera, another Carlist chief killed. This battle is said to have taken place at Villaqueva de Jara, but the following papers make no allusion to it whatever, and we therefore strongly doubt the correctness of this account.
