

...accompanying with a heavy gale of wind from the westward, washing away almost all the snow from our streets. This morning we have sharp frost, with high winds and snow falling.

Since writing the above, we learn that some houses situated in the upper parts of the town were unroofed during the storm of last night, and several fences thrown down—and also that the shipping in the harbor suffered some damage.

We publish from the Patriot a debate which took place in the House of Assembly, on the Bill appointing the times and places for holding the Quarter Sessions, in which debate it appears that the reporter has misrepresented Mr. Cartwright's speech on the occasion. In justice to that gentleman, we with pleasure publish the following explanatory letter.

Toronto, 17th Dec. 1836.
Dear Sir,—In the Patriot of the 16th December I am made to say, on the subject of removing the Court House from Adolphustown, as follows:—
"Mr. Cartwright had always thought that there was a necessity of altering the place for holding the Court, and considered the Napanee Mills as a much better situation than Adolphustown."
I beg most distinctly to say, that the above is not correct, and that I did not vote on the question at all, as I might have been supposed to have been influenced by private motives. I was called upon by one or two members to state my views, when I stated "That according to my opinion, the holding the Court at Kingston would afford more accommodation to a majority of my constituents than its remaining at Adolphustown; that many were anxious that it should be removed to Napanee Mills, but in consequence of my interest in that place, I did not wish to say a word. That under all circumstances, I thought it most advisable to let it remain at Adolphustown until the County of Hastings should be set off, when the question could be decided."

LATER FROM SPAIN.
We have received Malaga papers to the 26th October. Our latest accounts from Spain were received by the way of England, and as our dates from that country are not later than those we now have from Malaga, the latter might have added much to the information we possess of the state of that country, but such is the character of Spanish papers, that we can glean but little additional intelligence from them.

From their contents, however, it appears certain that the Carlist General Gomez, has made no further advances in the southern Provinces. On the 11th October, he was at Pozoblanco, and it was expected he would endeavor to retreat across the Sierra Morena, but it is added that General Roldan, Commander-in-Chief of the Queen's forces, had foreseen this movement and was prepared to intercept him.
It is added in the Malaga papers of the 21st October, on the authority of a letter addressed to the Alcalde of Alameda, from the commander of the forces of Benajez, that Gomez had been totally defeated by Gen. Roldan, and that Gomez and his brother had been taken prisoners, and Cabrera, another Carlist chief killed. This battle is said to have taken place at Villaveva de Jara, but the following papers make no allusion to it whatever, and we therefore strongly doubt the correctness of this account.
