3. And be it, &c. That at the adjournment of each and every Quarter Sessions, it shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Peace, to furnish the Treasurer with a list of the orders passed during such Session, according to their priority-and it shall be the duty of the District Treasurer to pay the said orders, according to the respective dates and numbers in which the same were passed at the said Sessions, provided always, that the officers of the Court shall be first paid-and the said Treasurer shall present, on the first day of each Session, a balance sheet of the receipts and expenditure of the District Funds for the preceding quarter from whatever sources, the same may be de-

4. And be it, &c. That whenever an order is passed or recorded by any number of Magistrates in any District within this Province, the same shall not be rescinded unless at least the same number be present.

5. And be it, &c. That in such Districts where there are not convenient rooms for Court of Quarter Sessions and the District Court to sit at the same time, the business of the Court of Quarter Sessions shall first be disposed of on each day in preference to that of the District Court.
