

Montreal houses want them? If a person has five promissory engagements pressing on him and an institution comes into operation that relieves him of four of them, would he be so simple as to reject that partial relief? I think not; as for the Montreal houses not taking the notes of this establishment I do not believe it, especially when part of my system is to effectually cancel my obligation in Montreal by redeeming my notes with produce, allowing there be any delivered in that city, the moment they are presented, let their negotiation be ever so recent, after having found the farmer the means of raising his crops, and purchasing his land, I would provide him with the best market for his produce; thus let him bring any quantity of wheat, pork, &c. &c., deposit it in one of the Company's Warehouses, at the time of depositing, I would advance him in the Company's notes, at 12 months after date, two thirds, the probable amount his produce would realize in Montreal, and as soon as the produce was sold, would pay him over the full balance of proceeds in our own notes merely minus charges, the advantage this plan would be to Agriculturalists and the institution is too evident to make it necessary to point out, to the Agriculturalist it provides a certain Market, and the highest possible price for his produce. This produce is a solid fund to meet our notes in Montreal let their date be what it may, and must consequently tend to establish the credit of the Company, as I have in my former letter observed, this produce system affords the institution either a creative or redeeming fund, thus if the produce sells for cash or notes of other Banks, then it is a creative fund, for the proceeds arising from it, will enable us to meet the notes given for the produce, and if sold for our own notes it at once redeems them. That produce will be brought to this establishment, on terms now mentioned. I know it to be a fact, that many have runaway with the erroneous idea, (not that I have any objection to it) that I am going to mix trade and Banking; let it be clearly understood, I do not mean for the Bank to participate in the profit or loss on the produce transaction, it goes to Montreal at the risk of the owner. We only advance two-thirds of the probable amount it will realize, thus, suppose for argument, Wheat sells in Montreal for 6s. per bushel, we will advance 4s. upon delivery at our Warehouse, and supposing the attendant expenses to be 1s. 3d. per bushel, we immediately upon account sales arriving, pay over the remaining 9d. per bushel to the Farmer, he is liable to all fluctuations in price, pro. con. Some Store-keepers have complained of this part of my system, as interfering with their purchase of produce; true this may be the case, but if I injure the few, I benefit the many, and look at the counterbalancing advantages they enjoy by not incurring without the most culpable neglect, a single bad debt in twelve months, this assertion requires proof you will say; true, and thus I prove it. The institution I mean to bring into operation will discount on good security, to any amount required, and that at all times; therefore, if a man has any character, he can procure good endorses, for a person would not mind endorsing for a friend when he knows the only risk he would run, would be paying the interest of the note endorsed, and the trouble of renewing, and I think a man that could not pay the interest of the money, his friend was the means of procuring for him, would not be a fit person to enjoy general credit; so that none but bad, or doubtful characters could be without the Currency I want to establish; therefore, in fact, this institution will form a standard of credit, hitherto unknown.
