THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

The Municipal Bill.—The consideration of this measure was resumed last evening. It may be important to revert to the first division which took place, when the preamble of the Bill was adopted, and the House pledged to the principle. On that occasion the yeas were 45—nays 10. The division which took place on Friday last on the 4th clause, respecting the appointment of the Warden, was as follows: yeas 45—nays 10. The House adjourned at 12, and the question is placed on the order of the day for to-morrow.

Sir Allan McNab, Messrs. Cartwright, Moffatt, and others, strenuously opposed the passage of the different clauses last evening. The position in which these gentlemen have placed themselves in regard to this measure though Parliamentary seems to us unadvisable. The practice of Sir Robert Peel has been, that when he found the principle of a Bill acknowledged he withdrew his opposition, and brought all his force to bear upon rendering the measure as Conservative as possible. Now in the case before us, the principle of the Bill was adopted by a sweeping majority—but singular to say, the hon. gentlemen afterwards left no stone unturned to defeat the clauses of the Bill, which were confessedly Conservative. Such a course may be Parliamentary, but for our part we do not like it.

Mr. Viger remarked in the House last night, that it had been frequently asserted of the Bourbons, that they never forget any thing that was old, or learn any thing that was new. This is no doubt politically true. They remained unchanged while all was changing around them—and when obliged to act, they invariably fell on the narrowness and exclusiveness of their views hurried on these catastrophes which they most dreaded. The same observation applies to some conservatives in this Province and indeed to many in Great Britain also. These men evince at all times the utmost readiness to embarrass every thing approaching a liberal administration, in the vain hope that they may obtain place and power. A little reflection one would think would teach them that neither the Government of England or Canada can ever again be administered according to their exclusive and narrow views of things. Such men may assist in the elevation of Sir Robert Peel to office—but will be doing their bidding will be advocating their principles? Assuredly not. The events of the last seven years have taught Sir Robert a very different lesson, and he has the world plainly that he intends to profit by it. Let those who doubt this read his last Tamworth Speech. We have heard many liberals say that there is not a sentiment or opinion in that speech which they do not cordially approve of. That he will follow it up by a corresponding course of action, who can doubt, and if so, can the ultras of either party be called upon to assist in carrying out such principles? It cannot be.

Great and mighty changes have taken place even during the last five years! and although the revolution which is taking place in the social condition, the laws, the opinions, and the feelings of men, is all very far from being terminated, yet its results are no comparison with any thing this world has ever before witnessed. "I go back, says one of our profoundest writers of modern times, from age to age, up to the remotest antiquity, but I find no all that is occurring before my eyes.
