A Coroner's Inquest was held yesterday on the  
body of a lad named James Cormier—found the  
evening before floating on the water between the

ternoon the 28th—Verdict, "found drowned."

An Inquest was also held the same day on the

ingly poor, living on a point of land in Mr. Mc-  
Lean's fields at the north end of the Town, their  
only shelter an old boat, without bed or bedding—

marily, not having the means to pay for digging the  
grave. From the evid rec'd adduced to the Coro-  
ner and Jury, the following verdict was returned, "That  
the said infant came to his death from the indigence  
of its parents, in not being able to afford sufficient  
shelter and the comforts necessary to sustain life."

The name of the parents of the infant is "San-  
ctus."

Mr. Envoy, I have read in the Chronicle & Gazette of  
the 2d October, an article purporting to be a cor-  
rect statement of the medical case of the late Lord  
Johnstone.

I cannot think that a statement displaying such  
ignorance of the principles of the profession could  
have emanated from the medical gentleman who ad-  
duced it. The practice being oblique,  
and the author of the article, I am sure, did not  
know it, as he has raised a day or two ago the han-  
daged the tail. We are told that the ergotism, that  
the sores made by rubbing together of the broken  
ends of the bone, "was evident even to the patient's  
ear," and that although this *ergotism* continued, it  
was "not thought advisable to remove the dressings,

such an opinion. The medical evidence adduced  
in this case, is not to be found in post mortem
