They given two of their young sons to me, who were where I attended the poor, who appeared as wise as a couple of geese, when I discovered they were training for doctors; and no doubt they called it humbuggery when they saw that I had done in one month what they did not expect to be able to do in their whole lives. Perhaps I shall be honored with similar language at Kingston.  
To the Editors of the Montreal Times and Advertiser.  
GENTLEMEN:  
In my hasty letter of the 27th, to answer the rally contained in your's of the 16th, I omitted to say your communication wrote a delightful article, which you stated that I had called myself the celebrated Oculist, which I defy him to prove, during my successful practice of between 40 and 50 years. 2nd, That I had charged enormous fees to those which resulted in nothing!—he should have added, "to him"—as I will venture to say that many whom he has attended were not only no better, but who died from some cause or other, which I understand fully. The trial of Dr. Williams, the Oculist, has terminated. The worthy faculty went out for noon, and came home, they returned to the medical profession against Dr. Williams, which ended in the death of the pretended society which instituted them. Dr. Williams was acquitted of all the charges brought against him. So has this matter ended. It appears to be the opinion of an independent American jury, that the people can take care of their own health, and of their own pockets; and that even if they cannot, they are at least of the opinion that the learned medical fraternity, already sufficiently overburdened by the vast weight of their own science, and multiplied duties, shall not have the additional load imposed upon them of taking care of the health and money of the community.  
It is not generally known, that Mr. Williams, whilst under prosecution for practicing in the District of Columbia, without a license from the Medical Society there, and for pretending to be the John Williams of the R. G. Dispensary, London, actually brought an action against that Medical Society, and proved in court that the members had forfeited their Charter! which induced the Law Reporter to state as above, that "the worthy faculty went out for wool, and came home shorn" of their strength, like Samson.
