We cheerfully comply with the request  
of "A Salamander." The following is  
the Act referred to by him.

An Act to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned,  
and to exempt the Members of Companies of  
Fire, Lawfully established from serving as  
Jurors, and in the militia, except in certain ca-  
ses.

[18th September, 1841.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to repeal an Act  
entitled "An Act to amend the Statute in that  
respects the Members of Companies of Fire,  
in the seventh year of the said late  
Majesty King George the Fourth and intitled  
"An Act to make further and more effectual  
provision for the prevention of accidents by fire in the  
several Police Towns in this Province," in order to extend  
the provisions of the same to the whole Province of  
Canada: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's  
Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice  
and consent of the Legislative Council and of the  
Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada,  
in this behalf assembled, by virtue of and under  
the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament  
of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ire-  
land, and intitled "An Act to Re-write the Pro-  
vince of Upper and Lower Canada, and for the  
Government of Canada," and it is hereby enacted  
by the authority of the said Act, that the said Act  
shall be, and is hereby repealed.

II. And be it enacted, that whenever any Com-  
pany or Companies shall have been regularly en-  
rolled in any City, Town or Place in which the for-  
mation of Companies of Firemen is by Law author-  
ized and regulated, it is the duty of the said  
Corporate Authorities, or Board of Police, in such  
City or Town, or if there be no such Authority or  
Board for the Justices of the Peace of the District  
in which such Town may be situated, in General  
Quarter Sessions assembled, of the majority of them  
being qualified for the same, to cause to be drawn  
and accepted their enrolment, to direct the Clerk of the  
Peace for the District, to grant to each Member of  
such Company a certificate that he is enrolled on  
the same, which certificate shall exempt the individ-  
ual from Militia duty in time of peace, from  
serving as a Jurymen or a Constable and from all  
Parish and Town duties, any Law, custom or usage  
to the contrary notwithstanding.

III. Provided always and it is enacted, that it  
shall be lawful for the Corporate Authorities or  
Board of Police, in any City or Town, or if there  
be no such Authorities or Board for the Justices of  
the Peace for the District, or the majority of them,  
at any General or adjourned Sessions, upon com-  
plaint to them made of neglect of duty, by any in-  
dividual of such Fire Company, to examine into the  
same; and for any such cause, and also, in case  
of the individual of such Company shall be convicted  
of a breach of any of the Statutes made for the  
regulation of the same, to strike off the name of any  
such individual from the List of such Company, and  
thereupon, the certificate which may have been  
granted to such individual, as aforesaid, shall have  
effect as if it had never been granted, and in the  
next preceding section of this Act mentioned.

Provided always, nevertheless, that it shall be in the  
direction of the Corporate Authorities or Boards of  
Police, or of the Justices of the Peace for the Dis-  
trict, as aforesaid, respectively, to consent to the for-  
mation of any Company of Firemen, in any  
such City, Town or Place, as aforesaid, or to direct  
the same under circumstances may, in their opinion,  
render it expedient that such Company should be  
formed; and that they may also, in their discretion,  
from time to time discontinue or renew any such  
Company or Companies.

Steam on the Canal.—We learn that another  
experiment is about to be tried on the Erie Canal  
of propelling boats by steam engines. The Re-  
corder Evening Post says, the well-known and en-  
terprising partner of the Erie Canal, has built a steam  
boat at Rochester, to run between that city and  
Buffalo, and that a fair experiment of its power  
will be made within a few days.

A boat of this description has been placed on the  
Schuykill canal, which the Philadelphia papers say  
will travel at the rate of six miles an hour without  
injury to the banks.
