ARRIVAL OF THE ACADIA

We are once more indebted to the politeness of our Boston Friend, for intelligence by the Acadia. She arrived at Boston on Tuesday last, the 7th inst. at 4 o'clock, after a passage of 18 days from Liverpool.

We are enabled to give to our readers the glorious announcement of the BIRTH OF A PRINCE—and to add that Her Majesty was doing well.

We have stopped the press to give this important intelligence, and have inserted as much as the time and our columns will allow.

We have also received the President's Message.

From the Boston Office of Wednesday Morning. The Steamer Acadia arrived at this port yesterday afternoon. She touched her berth at East Boston, at 4 o'clock. She sailed from Boston on the 13th inst., and has made her passage in 18 days, and brings us intelligence five days later than heretofore received.

The Trade in the manufacturing districts continued as discouraging as ever. American Cotton had fallen full 1/2. There was some recovery in the price of wool. The wool market and mostly all branches of mercantile industry were in depression.

COMMONALTY OF THE TOWN OF KINGSTON. At a Court of Common Council held on Monday the 5th day of December, 1841, the following Bill was read a first time and ordered to be published preparatory to its becoming a Law. By order of the Mayor and Common Council.

AN ACT relating to Licensed Carters in the Town of Kingston. WHEREAS it is expedient to consolidate the Acts relating to licensed Carters, and to alter and amend the same—

Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen, Common Council and Commonalty of the Town of Kingston assembled: 1. That the Acts relative to Carters, severally passed on the 16th day of July, 1838, the 14th day of January, 1840, and the 26th day of January, 1841, be, and the same are, hereby repealed.

2. That the Common Council shall from time to time issue as a public Carters any other healthy person, who is of the age of eighteen years, or his being properly provided as hereinafter mentioned, on his giving sufficient security that he will observe the laws and rules of the Council, and on paying to the Clerk of the Council, or to any person authorized by the Mayor to suspend any Carters' license for his misconduct until the further action of the Council is taken thereon.

3. That the licensed Carters shall have the exclusive privilege within the town of Kingston of carrying loads on carts or other vehicles of any kind, and they shall be bound to keep and maintain good and sufficient horses, vehicles and harness, and also a tight and strong iron-bound pincion, constructed for the carriage of water, to contain not less than one hundred and twenty gallons, with a convenient leather hose attached.

4. That every Carters who shall use any vehicle used by a licensed Carters in his business, shall have his name in full plainly painted thereon, in some conspicuous part, in black letters on a white ground, and be numbered to correspond with the number of his license; he shall also have his name similarly painted on that end of his cart or other vehicle, containing a certificate of his appointment, which license shall be renewed on the first Monday of September in every year as aforesaid; and the license thus granted shall specify the name of the Carters, his number and the description of his vehicle, and shall not be transferable, neither shall he authorize the Carters to employ more than one vehicle, to be drawn by one or two horses as the case may be.

5. That no person shall drive within the limits of the said town, any cart or other vehicle for the conveyance of coals, fire-wood, or other loading, for hire, without being licensed as a Carters; provided, that tavern and hotel keepers may convey the baggage of their guests to and from their houses, and their taking out a Carters' license, but not otherwise. No person who has been licensed, and whose license shall be suspended or cancelled, shall thereafter drive any cart or other vehicle for hire.

6. That no unemployed Carters shall, when called on, neglect or refuse to take and draw a load; and no Carters shall refuse to load his cart or vehicle with any loading that may be conveniently packed or borne thereon, not exceeding 12 cwt. for every horse; but he shall not be obliged to load or carry at any one time more than one pipe or portion of wine or liquors, or any medicinal or poisonous drugs.

7. That any Carters who shall be guilty of charging or extorting a greater rate for his services than is hereafter provided, or of cruelty to his horse, or of fraud, deceit, gross negligence, drunkenness, profane swearing, or insulting or improper conduct, in the execution of his calling, shall be fined for his offence, or deprived of his license.

8. That if any accident or injury shall happen to any person, animal, carriage, vehicle, or other thing, by reason of coming in contact with any Carters' horse or vehicle, or any thing loaded thereon, while the same is moving, it shall be the duty of the Carters, vehicle, horse and vehicle immediately to stop, and, if necessary, render assistance, and give his name and number; and in case any damage or injury shall happen to any article or thing conveyed by a licensed Carters, in consequence of his carelessness, inattention or neglect, or from the insufficiency of his horse, vehicle, harness or tackle, he shall, by way of penalty, forfeit and pay to the owner or person having the charge of such article or thing the amount of damages to be assessed by the Mayor or one of the Aldermen, and, if he be deemed necessary, fined in addition for his said offence.

9. That, upon any fire, whether by day or night, it shall be the duty of every licensed Carters, instantly and without delay, to repair to the spot where the fire occurs, with his horse, cart and pincion, and actively to exert himself in procuring a supply of water for the extinguishment of the fire, and there to continue as long as may be required by the Mayor, Chief Engineer, or any Alderman. Any Carters who shall refuse or neglect to do, shall be fined Five Pounds, or forfeit his license.

10. That every licensed Carters, when called upon by the Mayor or other magistrate, by any member of the Common Council, or the Police Force, shall be aiding and assisting with his cart or other vehicle, in the conveyance to or from the station house, of all persons arrested for any offence within the said town.

11. That the stand in place of tenders of all Carters, when unemployed and waiting to be hired, shall be pointed out by the High Sheriff, under the direction of the Common Council; and no Carters shall wait, under or remain with his horse and vehicle on any part of the Market Square, or on any street, square, wharf, or slip of the town, except the stand appointed, unless when actually and necessarily employed in his business as a Carters.

12. That the prices of fares to be taken by licensed Carters shall be as follows:—For every licensed Carters shall be taken, for every block and under, seven pence half penny; three blocks and under, eight pence; four blocks and under, nine pence; five blocks and under, eleven pence; six blocks and under, thirteen pence; seven blocks and under, one shilling; eight blocks and under, one shilling and six pence; nine blocks and under, one shilling and twelve pence; ten blocks and under, one shilling and six pence; and over seven blocks to the limits of the town, not to exceed two shillings; and over seven blocks to the limits of the town, not to exceed two shillings and six pence.

13. That every licensed Carters who is provided with chain wheels, and other necessary tackle for transporting timber or other heavy loading, with two horses, shall be allowed to demand for any such load, not being of merchandise, twice the usual amount of carriage hire.

14. That no person shall carry a load upon any cart or vehicle, without a license, except he be a resident of the town, and carry what is hereinafter provided upon his own vehicle; and in all things, as to the manner of carrying, or as to the weight of any thing conveyed, the Council shall investigate the case upon the best evidence to be obtained, and shall adjudge accordingly; but shall be incumbent on the party making the charge to prove any such offence or assumed ownership.

15. That any person who shall offend against any of the provisions of this Act, hereinafter in the various clauses mentioned, (except the 4th and 11th clauses) shall, on conviction before the Mayor or any of the Aldermen, be fined in such sum, not to exceed Five Pounds, as the Court may think proper, and in default of payment, such person shall be imprisoned in the Gaol of the Midland District for a period not to exceed thirty days, unless the amount of such distress be sooner paid.
