#### AFGHANISTAN.

The scene of the late disastrous defeat of the British troops, and the massacre of the entire army, is a country of especial interest now, and a glance at its history will be acceptable to all readers.

All the invasions of Hindostan, from the date of the failed expeditions of Baber and Scander-beg, down to the period of European dominion, have pertained to the Indus, through the passes of the mountainous region lying between that river and the borders of the old Persian Empire. This region, conq'd. Afghanistan, has been, from time immemorial, peopled by a number of hardy, warlike tribes of the Circassian race, whose language is evidently derived from the same root as the Sanscrit and Zend. Alexander the Great, and after him Seleucus, made their march to India, advanced by the route of the river Caboul, passing Jellalabad, where Sir Robert's detachment is now encamped, and crossed the Indus at Attock, the present great highway between Afghanistan and the Punjab. The former were said to be, but in Candahar, which they reached in 327 B.C., Seleucus, who had marched with Chandragupta, made a short tour of Afghan territory. Little is known of the conduct of these tribes from the decline of the kingdom of the Asiatic Greeks, till the fall of the Mughuman power of Cherasia, left room for Scander-beg, a slave of the last sovereign, to establish himself at Ghuzni. Hassan, his successor, Mahomed the Ghaznivite, about the year 1020, occupied his sway from the Caspian to the Indus, and was saluted by the Caliph with the then new title of Sultan. He was the first Moslem conqueror who invaded India. He made twelve expeditions over the Indus, and after ridding the Virgin Wealth of the Hindu cities, and reducing the Brahmins to submission, this favorit Eastern monarch returned to Ghuzni with his accumulated treasures. His son, Masoud, was stripped of Afghanistan by the Seljuk Turks, against whom he fought in battle, A.D. 1053. One hundred and twenty years afterwards, Mahomed of Ghori, the Afghani, assumed their empire, which he lost, but in 1127, the invasion of the Sultans of Zengi, again drove them beyond the Indus, and their Sultan, Ghalib-din, was chased into Kardistan, where he lost his life. A band of his followers entered the service of the Seljuk Turks of Asia Minor, and the grandsons of one of his leaders was Othman, the founder of the present Turkish dynasty.

The Afghani rulers of Delhi still retained their authority over the Mahomedan Rajahs of northern Hindostan, and their power even survived the short but terrible invasion of Tamerlane, whose myriads of horsemen, in 1398, spread desolation from the Indus, which they crossed at the Attack, to the Ganges. Baber, a descendant of Tamerlane, in 1526, took Delhi, subjugated the Afghan dynasty, and established the Empire of the East. His successor, the great Emperor Akbar, widened his mighty power in prosperity; but after his death, in 1585, the Uzbek Tartars took possession of Cabool, and, in 1619, annexed it to their empire. About the same time, the Mahomedites extended their power in the south; the Sikhs overran Lahore and Delhi; the Rohillas asserted their independence, and the Ruhili Afghans wrested the northern provinces from the feeble Mughals.

In 1739, Nadir Khan expelled the Obiliges from Persia, invaded Afghanistan, and added another to the long list of robber conquerors or invaders of Hindostan. In 1747, Ahmed Shah, Afghan, contested the throne, and repeatedly expelled one another from the country. Soojah was finally compelled to take refuge in India, and to throw himself into the hands of the British authorities there.

In 1810, Ranji Singh, the old "Lion of the Punjab," ruler of the Sikhs, and ally of the Honourable East India Company, took advantage of the disturbed condition of Afghanistan, and added Peshawar, the Eastern Key to the kingdom to his own dominions of Lahore. In 1805, Mahomed Shah, deposed, and fled to Herat. About this time, the English, having secured their independence, and the Rohili Afghans wrested the northern provinces from the feeble Mughals.

5. Resolved.—That the Vice-Presidents shall consist of the Vicar-Apostolic, the Archdeacon, or Archdeaconess of the Diocese—the Chairman of the District Association, and either the Clergyman or Layman, as may be appointed at a General Meeting of the Society.

On the motion of the Rev. F. C. Collier, seconded by W. Prentiss,

6. Resolved.—That the Lord Bishop of the Diocese of the President of the Society, whose sanction shall be necessary for the completion of all important acts of the Society, and especially for the reversion or alteration of any of the standing rules, and for making any addition to them,

On the motion of the Hon. G. Crookshank, seconded by the Rev. F. C. Collier,

7. Resolved.—That the Society shall be open to all, and shall consist of One Thousand Two Hundred and Sixty-four Members, and Twelvethousand shall constitute a Member, and Twelvethousand shall constitute a Member, and Twelvethousand shall pay at any one time, a Member's fee, while the annual payment in advance of any sum, however small, shall qualify a Person to be a Member of the Society, and to which their donations shall be applied. There shall be no arbitrary or excessive amount of subscription named, but a full recognition of the great Christian principle, "Every man should give as he is able."

On the motion of the Hon. Mr. Alderman Dixon, seconded by the Rev. A. N. Beumer,

8. Resolved.—That the Society be managed by a Central Board, in the City of Toronto, consisting of the President, the Vice-Presidents, and a Committee of twenty-four, or twelve Laymen, who shall be chosen annually at the General Meeting of the Society; and to this Board there shall be attached an Assistant, or Assistant Secretary (if required), and a Treasurer.

On the motion of the Rev. B. Craven, seconded by F. C. Collier,

9. Resolved.—That a General Meeting of the Society be held annually, on the first Wednesday in January, for the transaction of the ordinary business of the Society, on the first Wednesday in every month, until June excepted, so that special Meetings of the Board may be held upon the requisition of the Lord Bishop, or, in his absence, of two of the Vice-Presidents.

On the motion of the Hon. G. Crookshank, seconded by the Rev. F. C. Collier,

10. Resolved.—That, in connexion and correspondence with its District Associations established, comprising one or more Districts, into which the Province is divided, the same, to be composed of the Clergy resident within the bounds of the same, and all other Members of the Church, who shall be admitted in aid of the Society's funds;

that the Archdeacon, or senior Clergyman resident within its bounds, shall, or his Clergyman, be Chairman of such District Board, or Association, with whom shall be associated, as a Committee of Management, the Clergy of the several Parishes or Missions, within the bounds of such District, and one or two Laymen from each of the same, a Secretary and Treasurer.

On the motion of the Rev. C. Mathews, seconded by B. Craven, the Rev. F. C. Collier,

11. Resolved.—That a General Meeting of each Branch District Association be held on the first Wednesday in January, in each year, in a County Town of the same; and that Quarterly Meetings of the Committee of Management,—not less than five per annum,—shall be held, viz., on the first Tuesday in January, April, July, and October for the transaction of the ordinary business of the Branch Association.

On the motion of John Kent, Esq., seconded by the Rev. F. C. Collier,

12. Resolved.—That, in order to facilitate the entry into the objects of the Diocesan Church Society, each Parish, in the person of its Clerk and Church Warden, shall be a Sub-Association, in correspondence, through its Chairman (the Clergyman), with the District Branch Association, and with the denominational Parochial Committee of the Church Society. That this Committee do meet so often, and at such periods, as they shall then desire, to be most convenient, inviting the members of all the Parishes, in their deliberations and decisions,—that they collect subscriptions and donations from the members of the Church, in such manner as they shall determine most effective, and endeavour, by every means in their power, and exertion, the resources of the Society. That one Session, at least, be preached during the year, in favour of the objects of the Institution, on the Sunday
