Correspondence of the Hamilton Journal and Ex-OXFORD ELECTION.

Woodstock, Tuesday night.

This village is at present the acene of a somewhat animated contest, for the representation of the county of Oxford, between the Hon. F. Hincks and J. W. Armstrong Esq. The latter who declared himself (I use his own words) 'a stringent reformer,' appears the Inspector General on the ground that he has described the cause of reform, and, by accepting a seat in the present cabinet, become recreant to the principles whose profession ensured his return at the last election. An objection, so far as the acceptance of office is concerned, too wealt to require any extended reply-since this, viz. the appointment of men whose principles coincide with their own, is the very point which has so long been contended for by the reformers, and so recently attained. Is it not then aboutd in the extreme, previolity to reject that justice, when offered, which we so often thought so vainly demanded? Mr. Hincks has been one of those whose services have essentially contributed to elevate the reform party to the eminence which they ought to enjoy, and to obtain for them that consideration to which they are justly entitled. Add to this the fact that immediately after the rebellion, when reform was considered synonimous with rebellion, and all who did not agree with the ruling party were denounced as traitors,-he came forward openly and boldly in defence of the liberals, and it will readily be acknowledged that Mr. Hincks has strong claims to our sympathy and support.

There was an immense number of people present at the opening of the poll on Monday, and Mr. Hincks in an able and animated speech, fully refuted every charge of inconsistency or impropriety of motive. He argued, that the charge of having accepted office under a tory government could not fairly be brought against him; since there was nothing from which to infer that the present administration were inclined to favor toryism, but on the contrary every act of the Governor General, more directed towards one party than another, has uniformly tended to repress that exclusive policy and discountenance that oppressing spirit, by which our opponents have always been distinguished. The very fact of his retention of office being dependent on his re-election to parliament, and consequestly on his obtaining their approbation, was of schoolidged and acted upon, that grand principle of all good government-responsibility to the people, and so seen as this principle ceased to influence the the house, and course he pursued in condemning Mr. Parke's acceptance to office, and in opposing the It's necepting a seat in that Cabinet in which Mr. Baldwin refused to remain, he considered that Mr. P. had adopted a course which the reformers would letter to the electors of the county of Middlesex, to the long and unwarying adherence to reform which its electors had evinced, Mr. H. thought it but right to appeal to them in order that they might thoroughly understand the question before they recordd their opinion. That opinion was against him (Mr H.) and therefore he considered Mr. Parke fully justified in the course he pursued, and finding that such were the opinions of the party whose principles he professed, he ceased to oppose that calcinet whose conduct they approved. To a similar tribunal, he (Mr. H.) now appealed, and by their serdict he was determined to abide, and this he trusted would be held as some proof of the sincerity with which he maintained the true principle of responsibility to the people. Another complaint made fered the appointment. He assured them as gentleman and a man of honour, that the appointment had only been offered to him within the last four weeks. It had been said too, that he depended upon the tories to secure his election. So far from that, he considered it would be an insult to the tories to expect or solicit their support. Mr. H. spoke at very great length, and as I did not take notes, but now merely write from memory, I can not give you the whole substance of his remarks, which I regret the more as his speech was extremely interesting and instructive. Of course I do not I pretend to give you maything like his exact expressions, but you may be assured that the meaning

to the substance of his remarks. Mr. Armstrong, who appears to be little known in this immediate signify, was, so he informed the electors at the opening of the poll, once a journey-man axmaker, and he thought that he had done more at axemaking than everhe should at lawmaking. The objections he had to his opposent were, that the Francis Hincks of former times was not the same person as the Iton. Francis Hincks of the present day-that he had sold himself for £1300 a-year and betrayed his trust. It had been insinuated that he (Mr. Armstrong) did not write his own address, but that made no difference; so long as the address contained his distinct and decided opinion, it was no consequence who wrote it. Mr. Armstrong spoke for a very few minutes, and uttered nothing but the same objections, which, Mr. Hincks anticipating, had answered only the moment before. Mr. Hincks, previous to the opening of the poll, had requested that his opponent might be proposed first as he was aware that several unfounded accusations were about to be brought against him, which he wished to have an opportunity of refuting, whereas on the other hand, he had no accusation to bring against Mr. Armstrong which required a reply. To this arrangement Mr. Hinckes' opponents refused to accede. Mr. Hincks' speech was such as entirely to remove any shadow of doubt as to the propriety of the course he pursued, and several who went to the hustings prejudiced against him were thoroughly convinced by his lucid and candid explanations.
