Rolling act of incendiarism.—On the night of Sunday last, the tavern of John Drury, at Amherstburg, was discovered to have been fired from the outside. A woman named Mrs. Butler, who slept in the upper story of the house, together with her two children, opening the door to go out of the room, was driven back by the flames, which scorched her bosom, and burst part of her clothing; she instantly threw herself from the window, forgetting, in the terror of the moment, that she was leaving her children to perish. The pavement, upon which she fell, remained in a most dangerous state. In the mean time, the cry of fire was raised, the Hook & Ladder Company arrived, and, to save the adjacent buildings, tore the house to the ground; when the bodies of the smothered children were found in its ruins. The bones of a man were also afterwards discovered, whose name our informant could not learn. The tragedy was not however, to end here; for on Tuesday, the unhappy man, Drury, was seized with a fit of the palsy, and, having been carried into a house, expired in a few hours. What adds to the horror of the tale, is that there is every reason to believe the fire to have been caused by an incendiary; a young man, who has since fled, having threatened some days before, that he would burn the house. Navigation of the Welland Canal.—Some apprehension having been manifested, by Masters of vessels, and others interested in the trade through this route, (originating, no doubt, from the many unfounded reports respecting it, set afloat by individuals concerned in the business of rival channels of communication with the 'great West'), that the navigation of the canal, this season, would be liable to continual and vexatious obstructions and hindrances, from the operations of the workmen engaged on the new works now in progress thereon—the principal Engineer in charge has deemed it expedient to give public notice, that no interference on the part of the contractors, will be permitted: the navigation must proceed, without regard to their interest or convenience; and if any delay should be caused by the contractors, or persons employed by them, or by the Board of Works, the Captains are requested to give information thereof, to the Engineer, who will immediately remove such persons from the work. [St. Catharines Journal.]

Fire.—We regret to say, that, on Wednesday evening last, the store house on the canal, in this village, belonging to H. Mittleberger, Esq., which had lately been converted into a bakery, was entirely consumed by fire, together with a considerable portion of its contents. The fire appears to have been accidental—the flames breaking out while all the hands were absent, and had nearly enveloped the whole building, before any alarm was given. The fire company deserved much credit, for the prompt and efficient manner in which they repaired to the spot, with their engine, and played upon the adjacent buildings; which was, no doubt the means of saving the lock tender's dwelling, and other loose property near by. The loss is estimated at about £200; most of which falls upon Mr. Mittleberger, as there was no insurance.—[ib.]

Corner Stone.—On Thursday the 25th inst. the ceremony of laying the corner stone of the new Catholic Church, now erecting in this village, on the site where the old one was burned, last season, was performed by the dignitaries of that church, in their usual formal and impressive manner. The addresses of the Rev. Gentlemen officiating on that occasion, is spoken of in the highest terms, by all present, as being given in a liberal and truly Christian spirit of toleration towards all denominations professing the cardinal principles promulgated by the Saviour of mankind.—[ib.]

Inquest.—An inquest was held Wednesday afternoon, 31st ult., before Mr. Coroner Walton, on the body of David Stewart, (whose death is mentioned in another place) who was accidentally drowned in the Bay yesterday. It appears that the deceased, a youth of about 11 years of age, had accompanied some of his companions to Browne's Wharf, and, endeavoring to jump on board a schooner lying near the wharf, lost his footing and fell into the water. He was speedily got out, and carried senseless on board the *Admiral*, where even senseless on board the Captains Colclough and Gordon to restore suspended animation, and Gordon was called in, employed all the resources of medical skill, but in vain, the resources of medical skill, but in vain, the verdict of "Accidentally drowned." [Toronto Herald.]

On Saturday last a new steamer was launched in this style, by the Niagara Harbinger and Dock Company, and was in due form christened "The Commerce." We regret to have to record a very serious loss of property, by fire, which occurred yesterday morning about 8 o'clock. The flames originated in Mr. East's Bakery, and the wind being high, the neighboring buildings soon ignited and were destroyed. Mr. Matland's Distillery, Messrs. Hall & Leek's Candle factory, and Mr. Cull's Starch factory, all situated on the waters edge at the foot of Frederick Street, were destroyed. Mr. Cull, we learn was insured for a few hundred pounds. Another fire, we understand, took place about 1 o'clock, A. M. back of Spadina Avenue, when a dwelling house, a stable, and a horse were burnt.—We have not been able to obtain the particulars.—[Toronto Patriot.]

CEREMONY OF LAYING THE FOUNDATION STONE.
AT ONE o'clock P. M. His Excellency the GOVERNOR GENERAL will be received at the east corner of the City Hall by His Worship the Mayor, the Common Council, and the Sheriff, the Guard of Honor lowering their colors. A salute of 17 guns will then be fired, and the Royal Standard of England hoisted over the Stone to be laid. The Band playing *God save the Queen*. The Architect to be then presented by the Mayor to His Excellency, the Architect, that His Excellency may proceed with the ceremony.

The Stone will be raised several feet, when His Excellency will deposit the Medal and Box, the Master Mason spreading the bed of mortar, which will be finished by His Excellency with a silver Trowel handed by the Mayor, the Stone descending slowly with a Salute of 17 discharges of Artillery, and the Band playing *Rule Britannia*. The Plumb, the Level, and the Square, to be then successively presented by the Contractors, with which, having tried the correctness of its position, His Excellency will lay it by giving three strokes with a Mallet. The cordage will be then disengaged, when His Excellency will pour upon the Stone, Corn, Wine, and Oil, from three silver Goblets, the Band playing *God save the Queen*. His Excellency will then return the Trowel into the hands of the Mayor, and the Plumb, Level, and Square to the Contractors, and finally the Plan into the hands of the Architect.

His Excellency will then retire in Procession with the same formalities which attended his arrival.
