but not a tree over-in thing was to be seen; the vestiges of venture being confined to a creeping plant or two, an occasional cacica which peers from the crevices of the surrounding rock, and a third description of plant not unlike in form and flavour to the mustard plant. Thus much for the botanical features of our handly carned key to the Red Sea.

Of the 47th, which arrived in April last, about 1100 strong, 40 died, 70 were sent home, and 10S remained in hospital.

No acute diseases are here known : small nox is unheard of, and vaccination will not take, as though nature had implanted discretional powers to adopt or reject measures of alleviation or prevention, as the system might need or could dispense with them.

The sickness arises rather from exhausion, and gradual reduction of strength, with exposure to the sun, which is not always avoidable. Dropsy and depressed spirits are the prevniling characteristics. It is, however, a necessary adjunct to British possession, and must be retained even at a sperifice.
