

distilled spirits, taken into a healthy stomach, operates as a poison. And therefore 24ly, that the habitual use of it even in moderate quantities is immoral. In support of the first position, he appealed to the observations and opinions of many eminent physicians both in Europe and America. And in support of the second position, he applied the principle contained in the words of Paul to the Jailor, "Do thyself no harm," with very happy effect. Both positions were fully and ably maintained, and the poisonous effects of distilled spirits, and the immorality of the practice of using it in a state of health were points which were equally and clearly demonstrated. The address which occupied about 25 or 30 minutes, having been concluded, H. Cassidy, Junr. Esq. moved the following resolution which he prefaced by a few brief and pertinent remarks.

Resolved, That the thanks of the meeting be given to the Rev. J. Ransom for his address. The resolution having been seconded by Mr. B. Brennan, was unanimously carried.

The report of the committee was then read by the Vice President which occupied about 30 minutes, and embraced various topics of a local nature, and several statistical statements showing the quantities of grain converted by the process of distillation into whiskey, and the quantities of spirits consumed in and near the town. As this document will probably appear before the public, any further account of it at present is unnecessary. The acceptance of the report was moved by the Rev. John Smith by the following resolution, which he preceded by an address of considerable length in which he stated several interesting facts, illustrative of the principles maintained in the report. 2d. Resolved, That the report which has been read, be accepted and published. The resolution was seconded by G. W. Yarker, Esq. and passed unanimously.

The Rev. Wm. Ryerson then moved the following resolution which he supported by an animated address, embracing several very appropriate anecdotes illustrating the immoral and debasing effects of spirits drinking which attracted particular attention, and contributed much to the interest of the meeting. 3d. Resolved, That no member of this society can consistently with its rules recommend to the Magistrates in Quarter Sessions any person to receive a license to retail spirituous liquors, it being in the opinion of this meeting a violation of the 5th article of the constitution which is in the following words:—"That in order to suppress the use of ardent spirits to the utmost of our power we will discontinue it in our families, and in every other department of society to which our influence extends." The resolution was seconded by Mr. M. Cone, and met with the unanimous concurrence of the members present.

4th. Moved by J. G. Parker, Esq. seconded by D. Prentiss, Esq. Resolved, That the first article of the constitution of this society be amended, and that hereafter the society be governed by a President, two Vice Presidents, a Secretary and Treasurer, and a committee of not less than twelve, five of whom shall be a quorum; that the President, Vice Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer, and all clerical members of this society be ex-officio members of the committee.

5th. Moved by Mr. D. Yanalstine and seconded by Mr. Wm. Lesslie. Resolved, That the following gentlemen be office bearers for the ensuing year. THOS. MARLAND, President. DOCT. E. W. ARMSTRONG, Vice Presidents. M. S. BIDWELL, Secretary. CHAS. HEATH, Secretary. ROBERT JACKSON, Treasurer.

To the Inhabitants of Kingston, Having been elected town and church Warden, and having taken the oath to perform the duties of the office diligently and faithfully, I think it right to lay before the Public that clause of the Act which defines my office and its duties, and to request that all persons who may be acquainted with offences against the good order of the Town will give information to me. Only magistrates can punish for any offence, and if no complaint be made I shall consider myself exonerated from blame. 33 George III, Chap. 2d, Sec. 7.

"And also to choose and nominate, two fit and discreet persons to serve the office of town wardens for such parish, township, reputed township, or place; But as soon as there shall be any church built for the performance of divine service according to the use of the church of England, with a parson or minister duly appointed thereto, then the said inhabitant householders shall choose and nominate one person, and the said parson or minister shall nominate one other person, which persons shall jointly serve the office of church warden; and that such town wardens or church wardens, and their successors duly appointed; shall be as a corporation to represent the whole inhabitants of the township or parish—And as such may have a property in goods or chattels or belonging to the said parish, and shall and may sue, prosecute or defend in all presentments indictments, or actions, for, and on the behalf of the inhabitants of the said parish.

By an Act 39th year of the Reign of George 3d, entitled an act to provide for the education and support of Orphan Children, the Town Wardens are authorised by and with the approbation and consent of two of the Justices of the Peace, to provide and bind the said Child or Children apprentices:—This is to give notice to any Person or Persons having the charge of Orphan Children unprovided for, and wish them to be apprenticed out, to apply to the Town Wardens for the time being, and also any charitable disposed persons who are desirous to take an Orphan child under their protection, are requested to make application as above.

REMARKS ON THE STATE OF THE KINGSTON MARKET. The demand for wheat still continues good at the highest market price. Flour is depreciated on account of the bad state of the Mills. Distillers' grain, particularly Rye, is in high request. Other kinds of produce remain dull. There is a scarcity of Pork which if brought to market would probably fetch good prices for some qualities. Beef is rather depressed in consequence of the rather unusual supply. The great scarcity of fish which is at present felt over the whole of the northern continent of America, has its due effect on every description of business. Tuesday, Feb. 11th, 1834.—No alteration in the state of the market has occurred.

February 11th. From a private letter received by a Firm in Kingston we learn, that business remained extremely flat at Montreal, that Exchange was still at par, that Ashes are down to 21s.—and are likely to prove a bad business in the spring; & that the City Bank is not likely to lose anything by the failure of its Agent in New York.

LIVERPOOL MARKETS, NOVEMBER 27. The sales of cotton yesterday were 4000 bags, about 2500 of which were Brazil, 1000 of them on speculation, and the market was very still in all descriptions at an advance upon Friday's quotations of 1/4 in American, and 1/2 per lb. in Brazil. The sales to-day are estimated at 2000 bags, at prices from 1/2 to 1 per lb. in American, and 1/2 per lb. in Brazil less than yesterday's. There are 9 arrivals of cotton this week. 25th.—We annex our circular of 23rd inst. to which we beg reference—since that date we have more demand for cotton with a little falling in the market and prices advanced a 1/4 per lb. from the extreme depression of the previous week. The inquiry yesterday was, however, more limited, and a greater desire to sell was manifested, in consequence of which the market was again rather languid, and the above advance cannot be considered as fully maintained. The business in the last few days is estimated at 14,000 bales. New Uplands 2 1/2 a 3 1/2.

LONDON MARKET, NOV. 26.—Coffee.—A parcel of good ordinary St. Domingo, 1126 bags sold at 60s. which is 2s. a 3s. higher than the normal price; damaged at 50s.; good ordinary Batavia 56s 5d and 57s; there were few parcels of Jamaica offering; the Demerara sold at previous prices, but heavy; the Berbice was all taken in. There were no public sales of Coffee this day, and up to a late hour no purchases by private contract were reported.

REMARKS ON THE MONTREAL MARKET. Montreal, Feb. 3d, 1833.

In grain the transactions are but trifling, and from the inferior and unequal quality of the grain of Lower Canada, the prices take a large range; good samples have brought a dollar, while some of inferior quality have been named to us having been sold at 3s. 4d. On the Chamby River, we are told, it was contemplated, by an extensive buyer, to offer no more than 2s. 6d., of course those low qualities are wholly unfit for shipment. In provisions the transactions are very trifling. A sale of prime mess pork has been reported to us at 72s. 6d., but it was on a credit of six months. At the ordinary term of credit, we consider our quotations as nearer the mark. Exchange has declined since our last. Some sales of private were made at the end of last week at 3 1/2. The Banks give 3. Five per cent is the rate at which the Montreal Bank will sell, with a small advance for paper. The complaints of scarcity of money are fewer than is usual at this season of the year, and there seems no reason to apprehend that the present winter will prove one of difficulty or embarrassment. One failure has been reported during the week—the first that has occurred for a long time; it is expected to prove a good estate.

CANAL TOLLS. The Canal Board have had a special meeting for the purpose of regulating the canal tolls, and the rates are published at this early day, for the information of those who are interested in the subject. The rates of toll upon merchandise have been reduced 25 per cent., upon flour, salted beef and pork, butter and cheese, beer and cider, the reduction is 10 per cent. on timber, squared and round, carried in boats, the toll is reduced 50 per cent.; sawed lumber, carried in boats, is reduced from 10 to 8 mills per 1000 feet per mile. Those who are familiar with the old rates will perceive that there has been a very general reduction in the rates of toll. On most articles, the produce of the country, as well as on merchandise, the tolls by the present reduction are brought within a fraction of the constitutional minimum. The toll upon foreign salt has been reduced from 5 to 3 cents per 1000 pounds per mile. Previous to 1831, the toll upon foreign salt was one cent and four mills; in consequence of the reduction by Congress of the United States duty, the Canal Board in 1831, raised the toll upon foreign salt from one cent and four mills to ten cents per 1000 pounds per mile. The constitution having been altered so as to enable the legislature to reduce the state duty upon each bushel of salt from 12 to 2 cents, the Canal Board have modified the rates of toll upon foreign salt—Argua.
