THE FORM OF THE TENDERS TO BE AS FOLLOWS:

AT THE COURT OF

General Adjourned Quarter Sessions, holden at Kingston, 3rd March, 1834, it is ordered that the undermentioned Police Regulations, made and ordained on the 6th August, 1832, viz.

"That any person carrying a load with a Cart, Waggon, Sleigh, or other vehicle, without being licensed, shall forfeit for every offence, the sum of forty shillings.

"That vehicles belonging to inhabitants residing in the country, and engaged in carrying loads from thence into Town, and also vehicles belonging to individuals resident in Town, and employed solely in carrying the property of the owners of such vehicles, shall not require to be licensed, be rescinded, and that the following be made and ordained in lieu thereof, to wit:

That any person carrying a load with a Cart, Waggon, Sleigh, or other vehicle, without being duly licensed, shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of forty shillings. Provided always, that this Regulation shall not apply in the case of vehicles belonging to persons residing in the country, and engaged in carrying loads from thence into the town, or from the town into the country; nor in the case of vehicles belonging to persons residing in the town, and employed solely in carrying the property of the owners of such vehicles, or in carrying the property of persons to whom the said vehicles may be lent by the owners thereof on particular occasions.
