KINGSTON, TUESDAY EVENING, APRIL 29, 1834. The New York Mail of this day brings no fresh intelligence from Europe. The latest dates are to the 19th March.

Most of the Toronto papers have given different versions of the reasons which induced Mr. Rolph to retire altogether the corporation of that city. We have carefully perused the several accounts and from them, together with some private information, have compiled the following:

It is because it would afford him a better opportunity of making himself gracious with the Tory Junta at Toronto, by opposing the general wish of the people, in the House of Assembly.
