As well may you attempt to ston the current of commercial transactions, as to prevent suitable outlets for them-the enterprize of mankind will invariably command them in spite of all opposition whether political or local; it is by such improvements that the whole country becomes increasingly desirable, and its surface increasingly valuable.

Individuals at the east end of the province have felt and expressed jealousy of the growing importance of the west; and some who ought to have known better from the station they occupied, have opposed all improvements to the latter, from an idea that they were prejudicial to the former. Just as well may the inhabitants of the Upper Lakes attempt to prevent their waters from supplying those of the lower, as to stop the improvements going on in the west. The wise and obvious policy of the inhabitants of the eastern districts, is to render them as desirable as possible, developing all their advantages, and they are not few, and if they can make them more so than the western, it will effectually stop the mighty stream which has set in that direction, but by no other means can they do so. We shall probably again recur to this subject in our next paper .- Tor. Courier.
