SIX LIVES LOST BY THE FATAL EXPLOSION OF A STEAMER'S BOILER.—The first fatal accident of this kind, since the introduction of steamers on the St. Lawrence in 1811, twenty three years ago, unfortunately occurred yesterday, (Sunday,) about 4 o'clock, A. M.

TWO INQUESTS were held this morning on the bodies of the unfortunate individuals who met their deaths on board the Lady of the Lake. They were in easy circumstances and came in the Conference, Captain —, from Leith, sent back to the Quarantine Station, and detained for near a month.

Foreign News.

WEST INDIES.—Extract of a letter from a gentleman at St. Thomas, to his correspondent in New Haven, dated August 15.—"There have been some famous doings in St. Kitts. The negroes have all turned out.
