**EXTRACT FROM MR. STEWART'S PAPER, THE INDEPENDENT EXAMINER, AUGUST 23d, 1832.**  
TRIAL OF MR. HAGERMAN FOR MURDER.—His Lordship having commented on the evidence and explained the law to the jury in a very able manner, they retired and in a few minutes returned with a verdict of not guilty.  
"As the prisoner was about to be discharged, a circumstance occurred in the court which roused the feelings of many.  
"We were among the number of discontents, and meant to animadvert on the subject very severely; but as the AMERICAN HONORABLE has since been PUBLICLY made, we shall take no further notice of it. We mention it now with no other view than that the gentlemen who felt hurt, and who had left the town before the close of the court may know that a full and satisfactory statement was offered."  
EXTRACT FROM A LETTER IN THE KINGSTON CHRONICLE, MAY 20th, 1831, SIGNED JOHN STEWART.  
In 1825 Mr. Hagerman was Judge of Assize for this circuit. A trial came on before him, in the court house of Perth, for riotous and disorderly conduct of some of my misguided countrymen then employed on the Canal, at the Hug's Back, and I believe, for murder, as one life had been lost. In summing up the evidence and charging the Jury, Mr. Hagerman regretted that a people so generous, frank and warm hearted as the Irish, should suffer their passions so far to get the ascendancy, as to drive them to such acts of outrageous violence. He likewise reproached, in strong terms, the sectarian and party feeling which unfortunately existed among too many of my countrymen, and under the momentary impulse of which, they are frequently guilty of the most deplorable excesses; and, in the conclusion, he asserted, that the conduct of such ungovernable spirits was so galling to the feelings of all orderly and respectable Irishmen, as to make them blush for the land of their nativity.

This was "the very head and front of his offending." I must be considered as good authority. I was sitting by the Attorney's table at the time, reporting the trial for my own paper. "THE INDEPENDENT EXAMINER," eager to catch every word that transpired.  
It is not true, as stated by the correspondent of the Whig, that Mr. Hagerman made an apology to a party of gentlemen, who waited upon him for an explanation. It is true that some Irishmen misunderstood him, and that there was a good deal of desultory conversation among them respecting the tenor of his charge. Henry Graham, Esquire, of this place, and myself were usually with him on the evening of the same day, and upon our mentioning the misrepresentation, he declared that so far from attempting to wound the feelings of the Irish, there was no people whom he would more willingly serve and console, as the best and the truest friends he had ever numbered were Irishmen.
