WELLAND CANAL. At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Welland Canal Company, held at the Welland Canal Office, St. Catharines, on Thursday the 4th of September, the President submitted the following correspondence, which took place in consequence of a notice appearing in the Upper Canada Gazette, under date of July 19th, of which the following is a copy:—

"Take notice, that an application will be made at the next session of the provincial Parliament, for an act to impose a tax of two pence an acre upon all uncultivated lands, in the Niagara, Western, and London districts, and one penny an acre upon all uncultivated lands in this province. The proceeds to be applied to the support and maintenance of the Welland canal.

"The above was not inserted in the Gazette until late in August. Its being dated from Grantham, induced the President to address a note to the Editor of the Government Official Gazette, stating, in substance, that as he felt convinced there was not more than one individual in the township of Grantham who possessed a hostile feeling to the Welland canal, he was desirous of ascertaining who it could be, and requested the name of the author, to which the following reply was received:—

"Dear Sir,— I can have no hesitation whatever, at your request, to inform you, that the notice alluded to respecting the Welland canal, is inserted in the Gazette by the name of Mr. Clark, as the Editor. His name is given to me as responsible for its appearance, in such a way that I feel myself perfectly justified in this case, as in any other, to answer the question coming from you, or any other person.
