

WELLAND CANAL.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Welland Canal company, held at the Welland Canal Office, St. Catharines, on Thursday the 4th of take the Steam Boat down the St. Lawrence on September, the President submitted the following Friday morning, and reach Montreal the evening. correspondence, which took place in consequence of a notice appearing in the Upper Canada Gazette, under date of July 19th, of which the following is a

"Take notice, that an application will be made at the next session of the provincial Parliament, for an act to impose a tax of two pence an acre upon all uncultivated lands, in the Niagara, Western, and London districts, and one penny an acre upon all uncultivated lands in this province. The proceeds to be applied to the support and maintenance of the Welland canal. Grantham 19th July, 1834."

The above was not insected in the Gazotte until late in August. Its being dated from Grantham, induced the President to address a note to the Editor of the Government Official Gazette, stating, in substance, that as he felt convinced there was not more than one individual in the township of Grantham who possessed a hostile feeling to the Welland respecting him will be thankfully received by his canal, he was desirous of ascertaining who it could be, and requested the name of the author, to which the following reply was received :-"Toronto, 26th August, 1834.

A ROCK or large stone lies in the entrance of the harbor of Toronto, about 150 feet S. E. from the east angle of the pier-head. Upon it there are only seven feet six inches of water, whilst around it there is 9 feet 6 inches. A temporary buoy or billet of wood is laid down upon it.
