The shipment of gold from England to United States is stated, by some of the London papers, to be on the decrease. The deposition to export that metal has, no doubt, been hecked, as we anticipated it would be, by the advincing rate of exchange you have attached yourself. in New-York; the exporters be it observed, being fully aware that their acts were among the productcould not predict when it vould stop. For some time it has stopped at 71 pr cent., but whether it stances, which the London bullion dealers and exporting merchants could not foresee, -circumstances which, in al probability, will favor a further advance. One nundred sovereigns will now sell in New York for \$155,50, which sum, at the present rate ofexchange, will purchase a bill for £101 12s. 4d. Now, although £1 12s. 4d. will rather more than cover expense, it does not appear that, coupled with the risk of a further advance in the rate of exchange, it would hold out any inducement to the cautious exporter. Still it must be observed, that with an extensive immigration to Canada and to the United States there must always be an influx of gold. Immigrants we know, have written to their friends, "that the order they brought out on the Canada and advising their friends intending to emigrate "to bring out sovereigns." Now, all the gold which finds its way into America, as we have already explained, carnot go out till exchange rises as much above 94 per cent, as will pay the expenses of transmission. Silver will probably be exported when exchange gets up to 93 per cent., but gold will require, perhaps, 11 per cent. In fact, from this dif terence of values, a gradual substitution of gold for silver must take place in the United States .- Mon. D. Advertiser.


