

N compliance with the request of numerous friends throughout Lower and Upper Canada, as also the States, I have now finished my work, to be entitled "THE ANTIQUITY OF THE GAEL OF ALBYN AND ERIN," "A VINDICATION OF THE NATIONAL CHA RACTER OF THE GAEL," AND A GRAMMAR OF THE GAE-LIC LANGUAGE," which will be sent to the press as soon as a sufficient number of subscribers can be procured.

In compiling this briefsketch of the antiquity of the Gael, I have col lected my materials from the most esteemed antiquaries that have dis cussed the subject.
