

An Act of the Legislature of the State of New-York, prohibiting the circulation of small Bank bills after the 1st instant, is published in the papers lately received. What follows is an abridgement of the

principal clauses of the law: -No person can receive, pay or offer a one dellar any one who may sue for the same.

No Bank can issue under three dollars, under a penalty of one hundred dollars for every note so is-

No broker or other person can buy, or take at a discount, any note under five dollars of any other State, under a penalty of fifty dollars, and no Bank can receive such, in the course of business, under a penalty of forfeiting its charter.

As much inconvenience would result to the public if the requirements of this act were complied with. it appears to be the opinion of a part of the New York press, that no attention will be paid to them, and that small bills will continue to circulate as readily as if the Legislature had not interfered,
