It is therefore more than probable, that the learned "Counsellot" will have the same luck in escaping from the consequence of his nocturnal follies, as he had in avoiding the penalties of the law in his perjury affair.

A true bill having been found against Wm. Watson, (the same who was acquitted of murder) for an assault upon the constable Bradshaw, he pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 14 days imprisonment It should be said in favor of this unhappy young man, that his conduct on board the Steam Boat, Sir James Kempt, has been misrepresented. We have conversed with several persons, and the young man, according to their account, exhibited no symptoms of levity of any kind. He came down to Kingston on board the Kingston on Monday, and conducted himself with propriety.

THE KING C. J.
