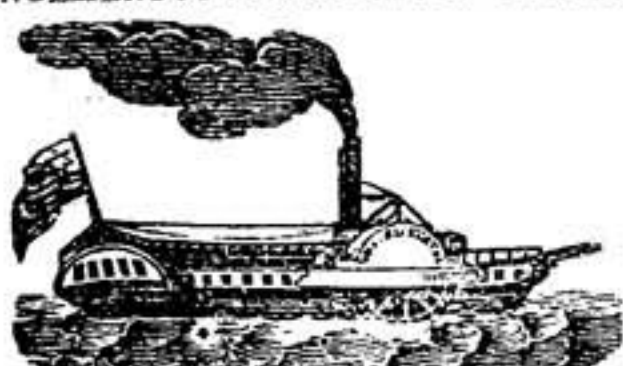


LAKE ONTARIO. ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE END OF THE SEASON.

Leaves Ogdensburg, 8 Saturday evening, Kingston, Sunday, 7 A. M. Sackett's Harbor, Sunday, 1 P. M. Oswego, Sunday, 10 P. M. Rochester, Monday, 8 A. M. Toronto, " 9 in the evening, and arrives at Lewiston Tuesday morning early.

BAY AND RIVER. THE FAST SAILING STEAM BOAT



Will leave the Carrying Place on Monday and Thursday mornings, at 3 o'clock, touch at the River Trent, Ameliasburgh, Belleville, Sophiasburgh, Culbertson's, Scanlan's, Wharf, Hollowell, Adolphinstown, Fredericksburgh, Bath-to-Kingston.
