**SHIPWRECK AND LOSS OF LIFE.**  
CONNEAUT, November 13th.—At an early hour  
this morning a hull of a vessel was seen off our  
Harbor, and with the aid of a spy glass, one person  
was discovered on board; but as the Lake was rough,  
and the wind to the Northward, it was impossible  
to go out to the vessel. About 8 o'clock, however,  
when she had drifted within about thirty rods of the  
shore, one mile west of the Harbor, two or three in-  
dividuals plunged into the Lake, and succeeded in  
getting on board, when a scene of horror and distress  
presented itself to their view. The individual  
before discovered, proved to be the mate, by name  
Henry Waghorn. He was unable to help himself  
much, and seemed indifferent about getting on shore,  
and by his side, lashed to the windlass, were the  
lifeless bodies of two men, and in the cabin ten more  
of men, women and children. The mate was put  
on shore, and soon after the lifeless bodies of four  
men, three boys, four girls and one woman, were ta-  
ken on shore, and decently interred, in the burying  
ground attached to the Presbyterian Meeting  
House.

After the mate had become revive'd and able to  
converse, we learnt from him the following particu-  
lars relative to the accident. The schooner is the  
Trader, of and from Otter Creek, Canada, loaded  
with lumber and bound for Cleveland, with a crew  
of four, including captain and mate, and 10 passen-  
gers. There was a widow lady and six children,  
name not known, and three gentlemen, one by name  
of John Richardson. On Wednesday morning,  
when between Astabula and Grand River, about day  
light, a squall struck the schooner which split all the  
sails and rendered her unmanageable; and about 11  
A. M. two heavy seas struck her in quick succession,  
which capsize'd her, and carried away both her masts  
and bowsprit, and stove a hole in her larboard bow,  
at the moment she capsize'd, all on board were be-  
low, in about five minutes she righted again, when  
the mate, two of the hands and one passenger, (name  
not known,) got upon deck, and all succeeded in  
lashing themselves to the windlass, except the pas-  
senger, who was swept overboard. The Captain  
and remainder of the passengers did not attempt to  
come on deck, but remained in the cabin, about two  
thirds filled with water, until they died, which was  
between 10 o'clock that night and daylight the next  
morning. The groans and cries for help continued  
until about day-light. The widow was bound for  
Cleveland, where she has a son residing. If the  
Lake should continue calm, it is probable the vessel  
may be got off and towed into our Harbor.—Gaz.

From the Montreal Herald.  
Every American paper which we take up con-  
tains accounts of the rapid strides with which the  
United States are advancing in their career of inter-  
national improvement. We are anxious to notice a few  
of the more important projected rail roads and can-  
als as they are contemplated, for it is next to impos-  
sible to describe all that are constructed, or to  
keep pace with every scheme of this kind now agita-  
ted in almost every section and locality of the coun-  
try, in the scarcely inhabited territories as well as in  
the old states.

A Railroad from Fairport, or Lake Erie to Wells-  
ville on the Ohio, has been determined upon by con-  
vention which lately met at Salem, in that state.—  
Distance, 90 miles. Fairport is said to be decided-  
ly the best harbor from Cleveland to Buffalo, and  
Wellsville one of the best landings on the Ohio, ac-  
cording to the Chardon Spectator. It is said to be  
the nearest route from the lake to the river. The  
Ohio Canal is 400 miles, running from Cleveland to  
Portsmouth, in the S. W. part of the state. The  
north part of the state does not feel its advantages  
so directly as the south. The cross cut from Beaver  
(Penn.) to Portsmouth has the same objection.  
This rail road from Fairport to Wellsville will bring  
all the Ohio and Pennsylvania commerce of Lake  
Erie more directly into the Ohio River. Estimated  
cost \$3000 a mile. Some little dissatisfaction is
