LATER FROM ENGLAND.

From the New York Com. Advertiser. Nearly two hours after our daily paper (Commerial Advertiser) had gone to press, we received London papers by the Roscoe, to the 24th of Oct. inclusive; but although they bring intelligence 14 days later than we had before received, the amount of news is very limited. Nothing extraordinary appears to have happened in Europe, except the departure of the duke of O leans from Paris, to Algiers (as some say, to take part in the war, and according to others, in consequence of a quarrel with his father, king Louis Phillipe) -- and except also a sudden vi sit of the emperor of Russia to Vienna, where he took every body by surprise-no intimation of his approach, or even of his intention, having been given. Speculation was, of course, on the qui vive, but the general belief seems to be, that it was nothing more
