KINGSTON MINERAL WELLS.

M. R. There are two wells. The first near the edge of the Lake, and constructed last year by boring through a depth of 115 feet to the primitive rock. The other is higher up the bank, and at no great distance from the first, leading to the residence of the Governor General. The waters of both springs have been analyzed by Professor Williamson of Queen's College, whose high attainments as a Chemist and a Scholar, it is unnecessary here to eulogize.

The water of the first Well, the Professor pronounces after a careful and laborious analysis to be of the same class and the same component parts as those of Cheltenham and Leamington in England. It also resembles Harrogate in its saline nature and strength, but is not impregnated so extensively with common salt.—It resembles Airthrey water in Scotland in the quantity of chloride of calcium, but is distinguished from it by the absence in the latter of the sulphate of soda.

The water of the second Well was found by boring, at about 85 feet from the surface.—It is much stronger than any other Mineral Water with which Professor Williamson is acquainted. Bromine, as well as Iodine, is present, as was found on passing a stream of chlorine through a large portion of the water concentrated to a small quantity and filtered.

The analysis of the water of both Wells, by Professor Williamson, is subjoined.
