

same there to protest, in the name of his country, against its occupation by a military force. (Hear.) He came there also to ask a simple question, namely, how was Ireland to be governed? (Cheers.) He would not ask who was to govern it, although he might have his preferences. There was nothing new in the system that had been adopted by the present Government towards Ireland.—No one could deny that no country in the world had inflicted such evil, had occasioned so much persecution, or committed so many crimes upon another, as England upon Ireland. The noble lord, the member for London, had ably and frankly admitted that fact, and it had been attested by the almost unanimous voice of the country, and of that House. (Hear, hear.) He would not go further back in the history of his country than the period of the union. Because he contended that from that time Parliament was wholly responsible for what had taken place. The hon. and learned gentleman then referred at some length to the condition of Ireland, pointing out the rapid progress she had made from 1782 up to now, and the increased consumption of all the luxuries and necessities of life during that period. During these eighteen years, while self-governed, she had risen an unexampled pitch of prosperity, and would have progressed even in her march of national improvement, but for the unhappy measure of the legislative union. The great argument of Mr. Pitt and Lord Clare was, that Ireland, advancing in the scale of nations, only required to be united to her more prosperous and commercial sister, England, to increase her prosperity three-fold. The hon. and learned gentleman then referred to the works of Kilkenny, and other recent writers on Ireland, and also the reports of the Poor-law Commissioners for the purpose of showing that there had been of late little improvement in Ireland, and that, on the contrary, it had retrograded to a considerable extent. For all that the house was, in his opinion, responsible, and he had no hesitation in saying that since the union almost every measure they had introduced for Ireland had been productive of nothing but evil and mischief. In the name of his country he protested against the late prosecutions, and not only against the prosecutions themselves, but the manner in which they were conducted. (Loud cheers.) There had been no instance of the exclusion of persons from the lists on the ground of their being Roman Catholics from the time of Titus O'Sullivan; nor since that period had any judge ever delivered so partial and one-sided a charge to a jury. He was glad to find it was the intention of the Government to give an additional grant for the purposes of education; but he would suggest that they should give the Roman Catholic bishops a quasi corporate character to transmit any property that might be bequeathed to them in their successors. Whatever steps the Government meant to take for the tranquility of Ireland should be taken expeditiously, and he trusted the day was not far distant when he would see Irishmen and Englishmen, Catholic and Protestant all united in one common feeling of brotherhood and affection. (Cheers.)

Sir R. P. D. denied the accuracy of the hon. and learned member's statement as to the great happiness and prosperity of Ireland from 1782 to the period of the union, and quoted authorities to shew that the corruption and profligacy of the Irish Parliament had reduced that country to the condition of a petty province. The right hon. baronet then proceeded to comment upon the manner in which Lord John Russell had referred to Lord Lyndhurst, whom he eulogized in the highest terms, and ridiculed the appointment of Lord Campbell as Lord Chancellor of Ireland as being a gross affront to that country. He had always advocated the right of the Catholics to a fair share in the representation and offices of the state since the passing of the relief bill. He then referred to the clamors that had been raised against the appointment of Mr. Sergeant Howley, a Catholic. He would only say one word on the subject of the address of the Protestant Operative Association. These addresses were matters of form, and when they had come to him containing harsh and uncharitable sentiments, he had taken the liberty to rebuke them. They were charged with a desire to govern Ireland by military force, but he wished to know to whom was it owing they were unable to present reduced estimates with regard to Ireland. In March, 1843, the agitation commenced in Ireland, and that was considerably heightened by the introduction of the poor law bill, the general agricultural depression, and the alterations in the tariff. Then followed the determination to agitate for Repeal of the union. The Government resolved to rely upon the ordinary law, because, he declared emphatically, there was nothing to be deprecated so much as resorting to Parliament for extraordinary powers upon the appearance of any unusual excitement. The head of the Government under similar circumstances had introduced a coercion bill for Ireland. It was said that they had entraped the persons agitating for a Repeal of the union, by making no declaration of their sentiments, but he thought nothing could be stronger than the declarations they had advised Her Majesty to make on the subject. He thought he had fully vindicated the conduct of the Government with regard to Ireland, and he should not be driven by any taunts from the course he was resolved to pursue. He thought there should be identity of representation and of franchises with England and Scotland, and it was upon that principle the Government intended to legislate. With regard to the Established Church, he found it established in Ireland for a period of two hundred and fifty years, and he should maintain it as it had been guaranteed by act of Parliament. It was upon that understanding that the Protestants had agreed to waive their objection, and consent to the Emancipation Act. These were also the opinions of Burke and Grattan, and Lord Plunket and Sir John Newport. After reviewing the policy of the Government towards Ireland at some length, the right hon. baronet observed, that if the agitation could only be put an end to in that country, he had no doubt it would make rapid strides in the cause of social and commercial prosperity, and he hoped he would live to see the day when the differences of Saxon and Celt, and Protestant and Catholic, would be at an end. Whatever station in life he might be placed in, nothing would give him greater pleasure than to see their beloved sovereign placing her foot on the soil of Ireland, and fulfilling to rest all the evil passions that had so long held sway there. (Cheers.)

Lord JOHN RUSSELL rose in reply. He noticed some of the chief attacks in his motion by the leading members of the Government; and brought up Lord Stanley, who emphatically denied that in quoting, on a former occasion, the words, "the minions of Popery," he either adopted them or applied them to Roman Catholics. Lord John Russell then went into some particulars respecting the retirement of Lord Plunket. "All the circumstances," said his lordship, "connected with that transaction, cannot be detailed now, but some of them may be permitted to mention. It had been stated to Lord Melbourne that Lord Plunket, at his advanced age, was desirous of relinquishing his situation. The present Lord Campbell came to me and asked, as a dissolution was depending, whether he was to stand his election as Attorney-General. I communicated with Lord Melbourne, and he informed me that he believed Lord Plunket was about to retire; he added that he would write upon the subject, and if he did so, the Attorney-General should be made Lord Chancellor. A day or two afterwards it was found that Lord Plunket, instead of being desirous of retiring, had no such intention, and I told Lord Campbell that, such being the case, neither Lord Melbourne nor I would do anything disagreeable to Lord Plunket. Lord

Campbell said he was perfectly content—that he would send down his address to Edinburgh and stand his election as Attorney-General. From circumstances which I need not detail, Lord Plunket subsequently retired. (Cheers from the Ministerial side.) I can assure hon. members that it gave me pain that he should have taken that course; and I regretted deeply that anything had occurred which was painful to Lord Plunket's feelings." When the noble lord had concluded, the house went to a division upon his lordship's motion, for a committee of the whole House to inquire into the state of Ireland—

CLOSE OF THE STATE TRIALS.

The Lord Chief Justice commented his charge. He stated, that on a conference with his brother Judges, he found that there was a perfect concurrence between them all as to the subject matter to be laid before the jury.—The jury had heard a great deal of eloquence—which was poetical, much that was plain, and much that was irrelevant. Of the question of the fact they were themselves the constitutional judges: "You are to determine and come to a just conclusion upon the fact; the law of the case you will take from the Court." For a conviction of conspiracy, the law requires that the jury should be satisfied that there was a concert either for the purpose of doing an illegal act, or conning or causing to be done, an act legal in itself, but to be brought about by illegal means.
