1. That a rate of Six Pence in the Pound ipon all the real and personal property in the said Town subject and liable to be rated, taxed, and assessed, by the Mayor and Common Council thereof, under and by virtue of An Act of the Provincial Parliament of Upper Canada, passed in the first year of the reign of her present Majesty, entitled,"An Act to Incorporate the Town of Kingston, under the name of the Mayor and Common Counsil of the Town of Kingston," shall be, and the said rate, tax, or assessment, hereby is, rated, taxed, charged, assessed and imposed on such real and pers anal property, as aforesaid, for the year of our Lord one thousad eight hundred and forty-four. .
